Among the Eskimos in the most northerly part of Labrador

Moravian Missionaries have been working for more than 160 years. Whenever they build a Church they build a school—for the purpose of giving the children a Christian Education. The problem of educating the children has become very difficult. The Eskimos no longer live in large villages where the children can attend day-school, but in small clusters wherever they find the best hunting. Two boarding schools have had to be established—one at Nain, the other at Makkovik. At each 30 or 40 little children are fed, taught and "mothered" during the long winter. In the short summer they are with their parents, learning how to become, eventually, good hunters and housewives.

This necessary change from inexpensive day schools to boarding schools, has laid a heavy burden on the Mission's slender Funds.

Will you help to educate one of these children? £600 per annum is required for each school, i.e.,

\$20 a year for each child.
