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

Sidelights on the Greatest Figure of History

IV.—CHRIST'S INTERCESSION (continued)

John xvii.

Christ also taught His disciples to pray.

Luke beautifully illustrates this. Some have christened this the "Lord's Prayer" and others call it the "Disciples' Prayer." It does not really matter by what title you call it, as the truth contained therein remains, and that is the most important thing. The real "Lord's Prayer" is to be found in the seventeenth chapter of John's Gospel. The former is the model or example method of prayer for all disciples of Christ. A number of fragrant truths about God are revealed in those four verses, such as:

- 1. The Fatherhood of God. "Our Father." Not the universal Fatherhood of the human race, but He is the spiritual Father of the race of believers. I do not believe in the notion that all are children of God but only His children by faith in Christ Jesus-we are His children by adoption. It is necessary to lay special stress upon this as the teaching of the Universal Fatherhood of God regardless of saving faith is an erroneous doctrine and most unscriptural. To a company of men Jesus Himself said "Ye are of your father the devil" (John viii. 44). It is only the redeemed that can call God a Father. sacred associations cluster around that word. cannot exhaust its meaning. In brief Christ wishes those disciples to understand that the love of parents to their children on earth is but as a drop to the ocean of fatherly love which resides in Himself.
- 2. The Home of God. "Art in Heaven." Heaven is God's dwelling place. After King Solomon had finished building the temple he prayed saying, "Hear Thou from Thy dwelling place, even from heaven; and when Thou hearest, forgive" (II. Chron. vi. 21).

 3. The Holiness of God. "Hallowed be Thy
- 3. The Holiness of God. "Hallowed be Thy Name." God's name is one which must be regarded with reverence and godly fear. Not a name to be taken in vain nor to be profaned among the people. A study of the Bible reveals that God is known by numerous names. God was first known as "Elohim" which means that He is the God of nature and that He is the Creator of all things. "El-Shaddai"

means He is the Mighty One. Isaiah calls Him "The Lord of Hosts." That is an inspiring Name. God does not live alone in heaven. There are thousands of other celestial beings there too. A frequent Bible term is "Jehovah" which has an interpretation of its own and means that God is an eternal Being—never ending. "Jehovah-nissi" suggests that the "Lord is our Banner." "Jehovah-jireh" tells us that "The Lord will provide" for our every need. "Jehovah-tsidkenu" reveals that "The Lord is my Righteousness." "Jehovah-shammah" is a name fragrant to the assembly of believers, and "Jehovah-raah" encourages those who are passing through the dark hour, for it means that "The Lord is my Shepherd" to guide and to protect. All these are holy names belonging to a holy God. In the Book of Revelation we find that the inhabitants of Heaven were moved at the holiness of God and they shouted "Hallelujah,"and we can shout about it too.

- 4. The Providing God. "Give us this day our daily bread." He is able to meet the need of the table whether it be small or great. We are dependent upon Him and He never fails. He never turns a deaf ear to the piteous appeals of the needy. He who clothes the grass and feeds the raven will feed you.
- 5. The Forgiving God. "Forgive us our sins." Very little is said about forgiven sin to-day. The reason for this is because we have lost our conception of the tragedy of sin. Many joke about it instead of weeping about it. Sin is said to be like a ghost, not real but only the nightmare of a weak brain, merely a mistake, a weakness or an infirmity which we cannot help. Such teaching is wrong and unscriptural. Sin is a very serious thing, a dark blot upon God's universe. Jesus regarded it most seriously, He never laughed about it. The Bible gives us to understand that sin is the most costly thing in the universe; it brings to ruin, sadness and hell, and it cost God His only Son; but through that death on Calvary forgiveness was made possible.

"In whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins " (Eph. i. 7).

6. The Delivering God. "Deliver us from evil." Ours is a delivering God. Able to make and to give a complete deliverance to His people. Deliverance from evil thoughts; from lust and passion. are temptations in the world-in the business house and in the pleasure house-evil is continually present with us but God is ever present with us too. He is able to conquer the evil one. Daily we can offer up our thanks to "Jovi Liberatori"—"God our mighty Deliverer."

To the child of God it is encouraging to realise that Christ's intercession has not ceased although He has escaped the limitations of the earthly body and is now in heaven. The Word of God tells us that in the gloryland He is still interceding for the Church. Romans viii. 34, and Hebrews vii. 25 describe this truth. An apt illustration is given in the Old Testament. We are given to understand that the duty of the High Priest in the Tabernacle was twofold:

First, to make Atonement. Second, to make Intercession.

Can you imagine that Old Testament scene? The Priest slew the lamb upon the Altar of Burnt Offerings. He did this in the presence of the people and they stood around gazing at what he was doing. He then collected the blood of the slain lamb and put on white garments and walked into the Tabernacle out of their sight and there he sprinkled the blood on the mercyseat and prayed that God would forgive the sins of the people. He was atoning and interceding on their behalf. Now, Jesus is our Great High Priest (Heb. iv. 14). Read the whole of Hebrews to get a grip of this remarkable truth. Christ first made atonement for us on the Cross-He shed His blood for sinners and afterwards ascended into heaven from the Mount of Olives-out of their sight He went, and He is now interceding for us-praying for us, just as He prayed for His disciples on earth (John xvii. 9).

To conclude this chapter it would be very fitting to give a few thoughts concerning the believer's intercession. The Bible gives us great encouragement to pray and it tells us for what and for whom we are to pray. It is our duty to:

(1) Pray for the world. We can pray for the redemption of the world. While Jesus prays for us we in turn must pray for sinners. This ministry of intercession is a glorious and a mighty one-not to be despised or taken in hand lightly. All Christians can have a part in it. The man who is shut up in his office; the mother who has dozens of responsibilities in the care of the home; the one who is bedridden and sick; the pastor who feeds the flock; all these can mingle their prayers together for a revival among the unsaved masses. Prayer still prevails for the conversion of others. There have been atheists and bitter enemies of the gospel who, after conversion, have become valiant soldiers of the Cross of Christ. Some of the vilest have become the purest.

(2) Pray for Healing (Acts ix. 36-40, and James v. 16). Almost every book in the Bible gives some remarkable record of healing in answer to prayer. Although I cannot understand it all yet I believe that God is still able to heal in answer to prayer. In this connection the Bible makes prayer a very vital thing—in it there are scores of cases of healing as a direct result of faithful prayer. It is blessed to have a God who is real and not a mere myth or an idea. Many to-day are proving healing to be a real fact. Dr. Torrey records an account of personal healing. He writes, "I remember how once I was taken suddenly and seriously sick all alone in my study. I dropped upon my knees and cried to God for help. Instantly all pain left me—I was perfectly well. It seemed as if God stood right there, and had put out His hand and touched me. The joy of the healing was not so great as the joy of meeting God." There are also present-day healings that cannot be disputed. All over the land men and women are testifying to miraculous healing by the anointing with oil and the laying-on of hands according to James v. Hebrews declares Jesus to be the same yesterday and to-day and for ever. Intercession for another's healing is forcibly brought out in the words of the letter of James, " Pray one for another, that ye may be healed."

(3) Pray for the Holy Spirit. A very plain statement is made in Luke xi. 13. It tells us that by prayer we can receive the Holy Spirit. Pentecost was preceded by a ten days' prayer-meeting. In Acts viii. 15 we read that after Pentecost some of the disciples prayed that other believers might receive the Holy Spirit, and they did receive it in answer to

their fellow-Christians' prayers.

(4) Pray for Help. (Hebrews iv. 16). God has made a way whereby we can receive aid in a time of need. It is sweet to know that above there is a sympathising Saviour. He is able to smooth the rough and rugged path. Able to lead out of the zig-zag avenue of doubt and despair. He is untiring in His desire to help us at all times.

(5) Pray for Cleansing (Psalm li. 2). In answer to prayer we can be washed from all iniquity. We can kneel in prayer and utter the prayer of the Psalmist and say: "Search me, O God and know my heart; try me, and know my thoughts; and see if there be any wicked way in me" (Psa. cxxxix. 23, 24).

Let us learn from the Master Himself the value of a ministry of intercession, and learning let us apply such truth to our hearts and truly follow in His steps.

T was indeed a great joy to know that the York Central Mission premises were again to be used for the purpose for which they were built.


No one, I know, rejoiced more in this fact than the original missioners—Mr. and Mrs. Atherley (Sister Amy) whom I was delighted to see present at the opening service. Well! during the week prior to the opening, I visited the hall twice. What first impressed me was the great enthusiasm of a vast body of Foursquare members spending their leisure time

assisting to redecorate and thoroughly cleanse the premises women washing windows floors, and walls, and periodically breakout into song and prayer-men acting as joiners, cabinet makers, smiths. painters, polishers, decoraprinters, stokers, etc., with a smile and pride that made one feel that a gospel that can create an enthusiasm like this must be "worth while.'' By the way, what a pleasing sight it was to

see Pastor Hawkins in overalls and doing the "common task" with the rest of his flock. What a transformation on Saturday, the opening day, the hall presented a perfect picture—comfortably seated with tip-up chairs, well lit and tastefully decorated. I saw a "great time" ahead in this Tabernacle as a soul-saving centre. On the opening night the hall was packed with anxious people in every corner and seats were placed wherever there was a chance of placing one, and still many were unable to gain admittance.

As I looked upon this great crowd I thought of the old Sankey hymn, "What means this eager, anxious throng?" but when the service opened it was speedily realised that here was a great crowd of people that were willing to give up their usual Saturday evening jaunt, to come and hear the preaching of the undiluted gospel of our Lord. Many people have been heard to remark: "What does it all mean?" and were answered, "Simply a preacher playing upon the emotionalism of the people!" but such critics must have been confounded if they went into these meetings. I heard nothing that had the remotest relationship to emotionalism. As Principal George Jeffreys led the singing of hymns known to most church-goers—they took on quite a new significance

-by the devotion and feeling with which the whole congregation entered into the true spirit of worship. When the Principal led us in prayer the hushed calm and devotion was an experience that could not fail to have a soulstirring effect upon the people. looked round that great audience and saw many good people who were members of the established Church and all the Free Churches asked myself. What is it that so

enthuses these people, and my mind wandered away to other Tabernacles where great audiences gather for worship. Why is it Westminster Central Hall is crowded Sunday by Sunday to hear Dr. Dinsdale Young?—the answer is, I think, simply because there the Bible truths are preached literally. Why is it the new Established Church of England at Brighton is packed to hear the minister who believes in divine healing?—simply because he stands for this truth. And this is really where the drawing power of Principal George Jeffreys' ministry rests. To hear the Principal read the Scriptures (without comment) is an education, and seems to put a new meaning into many passages of the Word of God. But when the exposition of the Scriptures came it was indeed a revelation to notice the rapt and silent attention of the whole congregation, as he

literally took us through the scenes and sayings of our Lord and applied them to everyday life. "Ah! here lay the secret of the drawing power of the Foursquare Gospel "-was the sentiment running through the hearts of the people. No wasting time in running down other religious sects, or quibbling as to who is or who is not in the apostolic succession—simply the pure gospel of our Lord and Saviour. And what a glorious confirmation of the words of our Lord, "And I, if I be lifted up, . . . will draw all men unto Me." The Principal lifted up our Lord, and the result was that when an invitation was given to those seeking the Lord, scores of hands were raised signifying a desire for full salvation. The services were very satisfying to many who had grown cold under the orthodox services that they had been used to attending.

Then came the exercise of the "Ministry of Healing "-many people look with disdain on this, but no true believer in the inspired Word of God can afford to look askance upon this part of Christ's mission, and His commands to His servants to "go and do likewise." It was indeed an experience and an encouragement to see the wonderful results of the "laying on of hands" by the Principal in the name of God Almighty. I could see many wondering faces and incredulous looks. But when you came face to face with the cured, and talked with them to find out from what they had been cured by the power of God, you could not doubt-it was there before you, and one instinctively took up an awed attitude and a fuller realisation of the love and power of our loving heavenly Father. In closing, the Principal's visit, the manifestations of God's power in the meetings, left me with the impression that so long as this movement sticks honestly to the proclamation of the whole truth as contained in the Word of God, His work must, and will, prosper, and must confound the worldly critic and the cynical attitude of many churches who fail to acknowledge this—the Lord's work.

FOURSQUARE GOSPEL ALLIANCE. Elim Tabernacle Opened at York.

Renamed the Elim Tabernacle, the former Central Mission premises in Swinegate, York, were on Saturday evening reopened by Principal George Jeffreys, of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alliance.

The hall, which has been redecorated and fitted with modern tip-up seats, was filled with a congregation of over 800, who welcomed Principal Jeffreys and his Revival Party back to

he city

It is just a year ago since he began the movement in York in the city's largest public building, the Exhibition Buildings, and he then drew many thousands to his meetings. Since that time, under the ministry of a young pastor, the Rev. W. G. Hawkins, a flourishing Church has been built up in York. It includes a large band of young people, Crusaders, who are active Church workers.

Since the founding of the Church in York meetings have been held in St. George's Ballroom. Nine months ago a building fund was started, and as a result the old Mission

was acquired.

Principal Jeffreys explained the Biblical derivation of the term "Foursquare." He said "If we are true and faithful ministers of His gospel we shall carry it in its four aspects to the people around us. We must preach Jesus the Saviour, Jesus the Healer, Jesus the Baptiser, and Jesus the Coming King."

MODERN MIRACLES.

We often hear the saying, "The age of miracles is not past," but we do not so often encounter such evidence of its veracity as was manifest at the opening of the new Elim Tabernacle, in York.

Out of a congregation of over 800, 91 stood as a testimony to the fact that they had been healed following prayers offered for them in Elim meetings. Among them were some very wonderful cases. One woman, for instance, had had to be wheeled about in a bath chair for four years. On Saturday she was present at the meeting and walking normally. Another person who had been stone deaf was able to hear the leader of the meeting speaking to her, although she was sitting almost at the back of the hall. Others testified to having been healed from such divers ailments as neurasthenia, paralysis, goitre, spinal complaint, nervous trouble, and one man even cancer.

Such experiences are not peculiar to York, but have taken place all over the country under the ministry of Mr. Jeffreys, the founder of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alliance, the movement which he now leads, and in which he is much beloved.

Preparation for Revival

A building was eventually secured, a place of former blessing, where souls had found salvation.

In days of old, the people shouted, cried, danced, sang when the Temple was to be rebuilt. The identical scenes took place. For years this splendid building had been closed to worship, being used as storage hall and billiard saloon.

The building was badly in need of repairs and cleansing, so buckets, brushes, brooms were requisitioned. Sometimes as many as one hundred,

soon produced a marvellous transformation. Glorious symbol of the work of grace that shall take place in many a life. Now all is ready! It is Friday evening. The Crusader Choir is practising for the week-

end. Bang, bang, bang. Who is there? It is the Principal and Party come to spy out the land for the morrow. Of course Pastor Edsor must try the piano. We sing, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow." Hearts are full. Such moments must be felt in heaven. Now we pray, some with faces and hands dirty; a prayer in itself. God hears and we go home happy.

February 2nd at 2.30 a queue is forming for a 7.30 service. What can we say? This day shall, by God's grace, be a marvellous one in the history of York

Elim Church.

Lives, homes will be influenced, joy instead of sadness, hope for despair, love for hate, singing for sighing.

The opening of this Tabernacle shall be the rending of the veil, and all shall (D.V.) enter into the holiest

of all, and realise fuller blessing.

We enter, and over the crowded platform are met with the texts: "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday and to-day and for ever," "The gift of God is eternal life through Christ," "Glory, laud, and honour to Christ the King," and

"Jesus: Saviour, Healer, Baptiser, Coming King," as it hangs from the reading desk."

Now we commence to sing,

We want everybody to be happy,
We want everybody to be glad,
We want everybody to be happy in the Lord,
And we don't want anybody sad.

A sermon in itself; did not Christ come to give us His own joy? The meeting continues. The Lord is here! The Principal speaks, "I cannot dedicate the building, it has been dedicated by the saints who worshipped here in the past." "Amens" come from many dear ones, as tears of remembrance flow down their cheeks. The Foursquare flag is unfurled, with clarion note the evangel of the gospel is declared. There can be no misunderstanding. Praise the Lord, souls come to Christ. The sick are prayed for, and one at least testifies to healing.

I will not attempt to describe the week-end. Hundreds break bread on Sunday morning; we sing, "It must be the breaking of the day," and determine more than ever to live for Christ.

Sunday evening. The Tabernacle is fully packed; a thousand present; numbers are in the schoolroom; crowds listen to the singing in the streets. God is in the midst. Nearly forty accept the Master.

Wonderful! Yes it is, all because we have a Saviour who is wonderful!

Opening of New Tabernacle CROWDED GATHERINGS

THE quiet little Hampshire township of Romsey, so closely associated with that famous Victorian statesman, Lord Palmerston, has just enjoyed a brief but memorable visit from Principal George Jeffreys, who officiated at the opening of the new Foursquare Gospel Tabernacle. Only four services were held during the two days, but they left a profound impression upon those privileged to be present; in fact we are persuaded the whole community has felt the spiritual impact of these gatherings; that an enduring mark has been made upon the life of this place as a result of this effort.


The seating capacity of the new Tabernacle was utterly inadequate for the crowd that flocked to the opening service on the Wednesday afternoon. Eagerly the crowd waited for the coming of God's servant of whose exploits they had read so much, and cordial was the reception which they gave him. To many of those dear Romsey people this was indeed a red-letter day for which they had longed and prayed; these special services represented the crown and climax of years of faithful service and sacrifice; to them it meant much, for those open doors spoke so loudly of God's faithfulness and resourcefulness.

Evangelist Bonifazi and his band of workers had done their utmost to prepare for the company of people whom they expected for the opening ceremony, but all their expectations were exceeded in the magnificent crowd which actually assembled. Their

and their cup full of joy at that which they saw and heard.

On the Wednesday evening the Principal preached in his own inimitable way to a thronged Town Hall; every available space was filled with eager listeners, and for nearly an hour the preacher held his congregation spellbound as he poured forth red-hot truth into the hearts of his hearers. It was an eloquent appeal to the conscience and the intelligence of those

The final service in the Congregational Church on The Thursday evening was most impressive and enthusiastic. The gathering simply drank in the inspired truth as it fell from the lips of the Principal. It was a presentation of truth irresistibly convincing. a few who came in a critical frame of mind found their prejudices crumbling before the veritable torrent of truth which met them. Most skilfully did the preacher wield the Sword of the Spirit, giving mortal thrusts to some of the things that challenge God in religious thought and life.

During the four services no less than thirty souls vielded to Christ. Many others would have decided had it been possible to continue the gatherings for a longer period. Those two days served to reveal the possibilities of revival; somehow one realised

and growing response to the ministry of the Principal. We venture to say that a couple of weeks would have witnessed a remarkable outpouring of divine power which would have swept over the whole district.

Below we give a local newspaper report:

IS A REVIVAL AT HAND? Crowded Meetings at Romsey.

"Is a Revival at Hand?" was the theme of an address by Principal George Jeffreys given to a crowded audience in the Town Hall, Romsey, on Wednesday. Mr. Jeffreys' visit was in connection with the opening of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Church in Middlebridge Street.

The local Foursquare Gospel adherents have for a number of years been occupying the Latimer Hall, but have recently acquired the ex-Primitive Methodist Church. The Romsey cause has considerably increased in numbers, and Wednesday's opening ceremony was the climax of a long expressed desire to have suitable premises of their own.

The Town Hall was filled to overflowing, the platform and ante-rooms being also filled with enthusiastic listeners. During the meeting about fifty in the audience intimated, by standing, their wish to be physically healed. Special prayers were offered for many of these by the Principal, who conducted the

His address was based chiefly on the entire proceedings. Second Coming of Christ, with detailed references to the prophecies relating to this subject, more especially the return of the Jews to Palestine. The speaker emphasised that this event commenced with the freeing of Jerusalem by the British troops in 1917, a date which, according to prophecy, exactly coincided and from 1923 to 1933 over 150,000 Jews had returned to their country. Reference was also made to the apparent fulfilling of the other prophecies relating to the present-day economic conditions, where man allows millions to starve whilst nearly all the granaries of the world are full and men toil all night for fish, only to have to throw them back into the sea because prices are not high enough. What results could they expect from Peace Conferences or Pacts unless they brought God into them?

The speaker added that he had been travelling up and down the land for twenty years, and to-day more than at any time he was sure that a great spiritual revival was at hand. Prior to the days of the Wesleys this country was on the verge of ruin, and it was the hand of God, through these two men, that saved England then. The speaker caused amusement when he said that if it was possible for the Wesleys to come back to-day he was sure they would first seek out a Foursquare Gospel Church to carry out their mission.

The meeting was interspersed with the singing of many well-known gospel choruses with musical accompaniment.

Principal Jeffreys concluded his visit with services in the Foursquare Church yesterday afternoon, and another largely-attended meeting last night in the Congregational Church, which had been lent to the local organisation for the occasion.

"It shall be opened" (verse 10).

How many things in life are sealed to us. How many things are veiled to us. No matter how diligent or desperate we become these things are beyond our endeavour. A sense of helplessness possesses the heart. There are some lives that are locked to us; we would fain find the key to that inner life that we long to share. There are mysteries of life that baffle us and leave the soul in an attitude of hopeless longing. Let us gather comfort from this divine word. God's hand holds the solution to all life's bewildering problems. He will make it plain anon. "It shall be opened" in due season. The gates of brass shall open of their own accord; the things that withstood all our efforts shall unfold before our astonished eyes.

Thy hand shall thrust aside All that doth from me hide Thy purpose grand.

Monday, March 11th. Luke xi. 14-26. "He that gathereth not with Me scattereth" (verse 23).

How much effort is wasted because it is misdirected or put forth under a false urge. Splendid energies are absorbed in pursuits that can only bring ultimate failure and disappointment. "Scattereth." Much toil but little if any lasting result therefrom. The endeavour lacks that creative force which ensures permanent achievement. It is when I labour in union with the great Master energy of the new creation that my ministry brings forth plentifully. The divine life flows through the manifold agencies employed, and the divine purpose is accomplished. O Thou who art able to take of the meanest service of these hands and make it beautiful and powerful, I pray Thee teach me how each moment to toil in harmony with Thee. In thought, word and deed let me always be in harmony with all Thy heart plans.

O save me from the fleshly urge That makes my path from Thine diverge.

Tuesday, March 12th. Luke xi. 29-44. "Take heed therefore that the light which is in thee be not darkness" (verse 35).

And so the light which is enjoyed today may become darkness to-morrow. It may well prove that the light of this day may only serve to add to the darkness which follows. It is the memory of the light that once shone within the soul that increases the mortification of those who dared to disobey that light. Then it behoves me to guard well the light that now glorifies my inner life lest some disloyalty leads me into night. If I tamper with the truth then I must prepare for a harvest of regret and remorse. If obedient to that light then it will grow stronger and still more glorious. Wednesday, March 13th. Luke xi. 45-54.

"Them that were entering in ye hindered" (verse 52).

The condemnation of not entering into life ourselves is terrible to contemplate, but how much greater is that condemnation which includes the responsibility of keeping others out of the Kingdom. It is a fearful thing to stand in the way of those who are seeking entrance into light and peace. The mother may hinder her little ones, and the father may stand in the way of his wife; the master may bar the path of his servants, and the servant may stand in the light of his employer. Few realise that their influence may prevent another soul from launching out into fuller life and light in God. O Master of my being, let me not cast a shadow o'er some other life that yearns for rest and fellowship with Thee. Some are seeking guidance from this life of mine, save me from plunging them into greater darkness. Make my life a magnet to draw them to Thee.

A kindling flame I fain would be That other souls may find their all in Thee.

Thursday, March 14th. Luke xii. 1-12. "The very hairs of your head are all numbered" (verse 7).

What a revelation these words contain of the infinite care of God for His own. Nothing left to chance; no believer, no matter how remote his sphere, but what comes under the watchful eye of Omnipotence. The attentive ear of the great Father and Friend is ever open to the faintest cry of need which rises from the fear-swept heart of His people. The smallest detail of the most commonplace life is a matter of concern to the Eternal God. He knows the unexpressed longings, the unrealised ambitions, the unsatisfied hunger, and He Himself is the all-sufficient answer to those burning emotions which none may share. \tilde{O} Thought of God, In Thee I rest. Thou dost encompass my pathway with tender mercy and loving kindness; a thousand things prove to my quickened heart that Thy protecting Love is ever about me, even as a mother's arms encircle her

O glorious sense of Love's protecting care; This makes the cross so wondrous light to bear. Friday, March 15th. Luke xii. 13-34. "Layeth up treasure for himself" (verse 21).

Life whose sole aim and goal is self. Vision that finds its centre and circumference within the narrow confines of selfhood. Everything made to bend to this master passion. Every offering laid on this altar; all the worship of the being poured out at this shrine. And thus the sweetest, noblest joy that life can offer is missed. The choicest things in life are sacrificed. The heart's true birthright is bartered for a miserable mess of pottage that cannot satisfy the central hunger of the soul. The shadow of self is cast o'er all the beautiful things that go to make life rich and pure. Show me, Thou who didst impoverish Thyself that others might be enriched, that true wealth may only be found in the pathway of sacrifice; that only out of the poured-forth life can incorruptible treasure issue.

> 'Tis only Love's sovereignty That can from self set free.

Saturday, March 18th. Luke xii. 35-48. "Men that wait for their Lord" (verse 36).

Blessed attitude of mind and heart that keeps me constantly upon the watch tower of expectancy. That prevents mine eyes from growing dim, or my heart from growing weary. Each day brings the glorious consummation of faith and hope nearer. Each setting sun serves to remind my soul of that morning without clouds which is to dawn ere long. The air is ofttimes laden with the sweet incense of Thy nearness. All creation seems to share the passion that burns at my breast. The trees seem instinct with song the burden of which is always of the Coming One. One day He will break through the veil of clouds, and this watchful heart shall hear the command of its Beloved, and on the wings that love hath bestowed shall be borne to the bridal banquet of the Lamb. then O my soul, comfort thyself with the tender assurance of His appearing which the Spirit breathes within thee.

Only a little while until The Bridegroom's call thy soul shall thrill,

All untroubled, unmoved, there sitteth on the throne of the heavens the eternal I Am, and turning to the Son He declares Him to be the eternal Thou Art. Thou art My Son, this day have I begotten Thee. To-day, since His divine relationship could know no yesterday, no to-morrow. Where in the volume of the Book is there any language like this spoken to the angels? They are but creatures, sinless and of vast intelligence, but for ever separated from the Creator by an infinite distance. And by a word that cannot be broken to this Son is promised the heathen for His inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for a possession.—Mark Guy Pearse.

TE are—ye are—ye are all the children of God' by faith in Christ Jesus. Let us be emphatic and stress the fact again and again that by faith in Christ Jesus we actually become the sons of God. There is no surmise about it-it is an actual fact. The Word of God does not leave the question of salvation vague. It does not leave it for some distant date. It makes it absolutely clear that by faith in Christ Jesus we do-here and now-become the sons of God.

I was greatly impressed recently in visiting a lady who told me about her old minister. She had many difficulties, hopes and fears in her Christian life, but "But you are a child of God, are you not?" "Yes," she would reply. "Well then," he said, "If you are a child of God you can trust your heavenly Father to take care of you." Thus it was that he frequently spoke to her, and thus it was that she was again and again encouraged in her Christian life.

The same thought will encourage us. Let us truly realise our sonship and many a mountain will become a molehill, and many a misty sorrow will vanish before the sunshine of faith.

1. If I am a child of God then I am born of God. And if I am born of God then I ought to

SHOW FORTH HIS NATURE.

The child should be like the Father-especially when that Father is perfect. Yet we have to allow that even in the natural sphere a child may show forth very little of its parents' nature. True the child is a partaker of father and mother's nature, yet many a lad is strangely unlike his father, and many a girl is painfully unlike her mother. Father may be truthful, the son may be deceitful. The mother may be a quiet dignified lady, the daughter may be a proud upstart. Sometimes there is a marked likeness between children and parents but at other times that likeness is sadly vague.

The same may be true in the Christian life. Although we are born of God and thus made partakers of the divine nature it is so possible to press our own human nature to the front that the divine nature is hidden. Let us be very practical and ask ourselves if we have been showing forth our divine Father's nature during the week. Let us think of three spheres—the home, the school, the Church. Have we shown forth the nature of God in these places? Someone may ask, "What is the nature of God?" What must I show forth in order to prove to others that I do belong to Him? There could be many replies. But let us condense our thoughts to two. First:

THE NATURE OF GOD

never causes unnecessary suffering. God does cause suffering. The laws governing the universe are filled




with latent suffering. Disobey the laws of God in the natural or spiritual world and there is suffering. The Lord disciplines the world with suffering. But he never causes unnecessary suffering. No needless tear has ever been shed by God's action. No needless sigh or sob has ever arisen through His dealings with His children. Let us ask ourselves if we have caused *unnecessary* suffering. Have we brought an unnecessary tear to a tender heart? Have we caused a sensitive soul to bleed in silence? Have we made some head bury itself between tear-stained hands in unnecessary grief? Have we sent some frail life hurrying a little more quickly to a premature grave? Think of the home—Have we caused unnecessary suf-fering there? Think of the business—Have we caused unnecessary suffering there? Think of the Church— Have we caused unnecessary suffering there? If we have then we have not been showing forth the nature of our heavenly Parent.

Secondly: The nature of God is active in finding opportunities for doing good. God does not wait for opportunities of doing good to visit Him-no, He seeks them out. God does not wait at home for opportunities to do good: He goes

OUT INTO THE DARKNESS

to find opportunities. Have we been like that? Have we lifted up our eyes and eagerly scanned the horizon to see what we can do? Maybe we have scanned the horizon? Well, it is good to look to the distant places, but have we also looked round our own neighbourhood and round our own home in order to see what good we could do? The nature of God does not wait for an aching head to be brought for a soothing touch. God actively searches for the aching head and places a cooling hand upon the fevered brow. Have we acted like that? If so, then we have shown forth the nature of God. Those who love as Christ loves do not wait for the needy Samaritans to come to Jerusalem: they must needs go into Samaria because acts of love await them there.

2. If I am a child of God then He is willing to take full responsibility for me. I am composed of body, soul and spirit. True God is interested in my spirit, but He is also interested in my body and soul. It is not one third of me that belongs to Him, neither is it two thirds. It is three thirds—the whole of me. My body is open to the world, my spirit is open to God;

the condition of my soul is the resultant of the two. My soul receives influences and impressions from God and man, from heaven and earth, from my body and from my spirit. In

THE TABERNACLE OF ISRAEL

the Outer Court was open to the world, the Holy of Holies was open to God, and the Holy Place was the resultant of the two. So with my body, soul and spirit. But just as the God of Israel took full responsibility for the whole of the Tabernacle so He takes full responsibility for the whole of man.

If we remember this then we shall be prepared to trust Him completely. More trust is our great need. We don't trust God as fully as we should. We get a "try" into our trust. In fact we spell trust in the wrong way. Instead of T-R-U-S-T we spell it T-R-Y—ŠT.

One of the finest descriptions of trust is that of Paul's-" I know that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him." Yes I am fully persuaded—yes, absolutely persuaded that that which I have committed unto Him He will keep. responsibility is no longer mine-it is His. Once I owned myself, but now He owns me. When I was my own property I tried to look after myself, but now God is the property owner, and He has the responsibility. I am His child-praise God, I am His child. Why should I worry, then? Why should I rush to and fro as though I must look after myself? Why should I look to this doctor and that doctor? Why should I try this treatment and that treatment? Is it not better to cast

ALL RESPONSIBILITY UPON GOD?

He wants to accept the responsibility, why should I deny Him His fatherly rights? I will not deny Him His rights. I will remember that I am His child and I will trust my Father.

3. The cost of my becoming a child of God was the travail of Christ's soul. "He shall see of the travail of His soul and shall be satisfied." "Travail" comes from a word meaning "Wearing effort." Yes, on the Cross Christ travailed for us. In the natural world there is travail before birth. It is the same in the spiritual world. Out of His sufferings we have been born. The Lord Jesus can look upon every

man and woman born into His Kingdom and say "I suffered for you. Yes, I travailed unto death that you might have glorious life." No tongue can tell what we owe to our blessed Lord. He went into the jaws of death in order that we might go through the gates of life.

Then note how Isaiah liii. 11 says, "And shall be satisfied." Think of a mother when her child is born into the world. She is satisfied. The pain is over, the joy has come. Another has been added to the family. Yes, she is satisfied. But the fullest satisfaction is not when her firstborn appears, neither her secondborn. Her

FULLEST SATISFACTION

is when the whole family is complete. Then she is really, really satisfied. She looks upon each one. She knows her creative work is finished. No more will she pass through the Valley of the Shadow. No more will she suffer the anguish. She indeed sees the completed result of her motherly suffering—she is satisfied. So it is with the Lord Jesus. There is a measure of satisfaction every time one is born into the Kingdom. But the great satisfaction will come when the whole family is complete. In glory that completed family will stand. Saints of all ages will be there. Our loved ones who have died in Christ will all be there. Adam, Paul, Wesley, Spurgeon, and myriads of others will be there. The family will be complete. The Lord will look round upon the blood-washed multitude that no man can number and He will be satisfied. He will know that His suffering was not in vain. He died alone, but the death of the heavenly grain of wheat has brought forth an abundant harvest. What a gathering that will be! He will be satisfied, we shall be satisfied. Sons and daughters in one great heavenly family because He was ready to travail for us. Surely we should praise Him. Surely we should again consecrate our lives to Him. Love so amazing, so divine, does indeed demand our soul, our life, our all.

Yes.

THE COST WAS TREMENDOUS.

No one knows the agony He went through. But we already know in measure, and shall know in increasing measure, the joys into which we have been brought. Let us repeat it again and again, "I am a child of God through faith in Christ Jesus." Wonderful truth, satisfying truth—I am, not I shall be, I am a child of God through faith in Christ Jesus. Therefore I will trust and not be afraid. I will cast my care upon Him for He careth for me as a father careth for his child. I am a child of a King. I am a son of God. I have been born again. I belong to the Royal Family of Heaven. All is well.



Contact with God.

Whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive.—Matthew xxi. 22.

ALL the victories of prayer are possible to him that believeth. "When ye pray, believe that ye receive the things that ye ask, and ye shall have them." It is not the strength and the length of the prayer that prevails, but the simplicity of the confidence. It is the prayer of faith that claims the healing power of the unchanging Saviour. It is the prayer of faith that reaches the soul that no human hand, perhaps, can approach, and sometimes brings from heaven the answer before the echo of the petition has died away. God has always been ready to do, and is hindered only by His people's unbelief. We may not be called to public service, or qualified for instructive speech, or endowed with wealth and influence, but to each of us is given the power to touch the hand of Omnipotence and minister at the golden altar of prevailing prayer. Newness of Life.

How to Read the Word.

DR. Bonar somewhere regrets that his interest in the Bible was so largely intellectual rather than spiritual and devout; but many never get at all beyond the intellectual interest. The Foursquare Revival Party in Aberdeen

How It Strikes a Stranger

HIS is not an account of the campaign of the Revival Party in Aberdeen, but simply some impressions of it which were formed in two flying visits. A friend of mine had come in contact with the Foursquare Church in Aberdeen, and had been much attracted by their success with young people. Hearing from them of the campaign, he told me and we decided to go and see for ourselves.

My own interest was of longer standing and had its source in what I had heard of Principal Jeffreys' work as a teacher of divine healing. For over twenty years spiritual healing has been one of the chief interests of my life and I am always keen to learn more about it.

We motored to Aberdeen and reached there in time for the evening meeting. My first impression was an immediate sense of the "live" atmosphere of the assembly. Never before have I experienced this in quite the same degree and quality. It was something quite out of the ordinary. But I was at no loss to account for it. My own personal experience of spiritual healing gave me the clue. Healing, of soul and body, is the result of a great inflow of divine life and power. The gathering together of a number of people who have had this experience cannot but result in the kind of atmosphere which in journalese is called "electrical."

The next impression was a sense of being perfectly at home, and that also was easy to explain. Life and love are twins. The more life you have, the more love you must radiate; and in such an atmosphere every Christian feels at home.

These impressions were abiding. They were renewed at every meeting and they remain as a happy memory.

Then the singing was a sheer delight. Certainly such leaders as Messrs. Darragh and Edsor could coax the music out of almost anybody, but there was more in it than that. The congregation sang as if their hearts were singing too, overflowing with the abundant life. After all, is it surprising that health, which is harmony, should result in improved vocal harmony?

A speaker who has things prepared for him like that should find it easy to speak, but Mr. McWhirter's address took me by surprise. It was quite different from the ordinary evangelistic appeal in its calm, logical, reasoned statements. It seemed more suited to an audience of students than to an ordinary congregation. Yet its theme, from start to finish, was Christ—Saviour, Healer, Life-giver, King; the same yesterday and to-day and for ever—and the congregation seemed to appreciate it as much as I did.

On the second occasion I was alone, on a still briefer visit, to see and hear Principal Jeffreys. His address, on Physical Healing, was a masterly defence and exposition of this aspect of the work, delivered with the authority of the man who knows whereof

he speaks. I had the privilege of a talk with him afterwards and was delighted with his unpretending simplicity of manner. There was not a trace of the aloofness one might expect in the founder of a great religious movement, but instead a simple brotherliness that had an irresistible attraction. This indeed, characterises the whole party. They make a splendid soul-winning team and the winsomeness that wins hearts is no small part of the secret of their success, as it must be in every successful soul-winner. They work splendidly together yet not in the least mechanically, but with an easy, joyous naturalness that evinced a real mastery of their job.

In conclusion, what can anyone, who comes into personal contact with this work and is not content with mere hearsay evidence, say of it but that it must be of God and wish it God-speed with all his heart.

JEHOVAH MY STRENGTH

Jehovah is my strength and my shield; my heart hath trusted in Him, and I am helped " (Psa. xxviii. 7, A.S.V.).

A father once rose in one of Mr. Moody's meetings and told the following incident: "This morning my little girl and I started to take a walk together. Though only four years old, she is a sturdy, selfreliant little lassie and thought she could walk very well alone. So she refused to take hold of my profferred hand, and skipped along beside me in joyful independence. Presently we came to an icy place where the footing was slippery and uncertain. At this point she took hold of my little finger, and then, as the path grew worse, by degrees of my whole hand. As we went on we came to still worse places, where it was hard for even my mature strength to walk safely. Then she left go of my hand, and said, ' Papa, take hold of me.' She knew that I was strong, and that if I held her hand in mine, she could not fall unless I fell. It came over me like a flash that this was an object lesson for me. I have been slipping, slipping, slipping for the last eleven years and my child's simple words and action revealed to me that it was because I had not put my hand into the hand of God. As long as He has hold of me I cannot fall. He would have to be dethroned first. My heart went up in a mighty appeal to be taken and kept by divine power. And now I can say with confidence: "Jehovah is my strength and my shield; my heart hath trusted in Him and I am helped."

Whenever you go to a sinner, go with the thought that God wants him, and has sent you to bring him to Him.

ALL-ROUND PROGRESS. Pentecostal outpouring.

East Ham (Pastor J. Kennedy). The annual Fellowship Tea and Business Meeting took place recently. The refreshments provided were excellent and there was a large number present.

Crusader Campaign at Southampton


We have just completed a Crusader campaign here in Southampton, that has proved a blessing both to the Church

be also." In these few words Jesus expressed a great truth. He knew the human heart. He knew that our affection is sure to be set upon the things that we treasure. And there is nothing said against the idea of having treasures. The desire to possess and lay up is present in every person, to some extent, and is not wrong if directed in the right way. For these earthly possessions, if used in the service of the Lord, will be the means of winning souls for Him and thus laying up treasures in heaven. And this is the kind of treasure that Jesus not only commends and approves, but actually commands us to lay up.

He first tells of the folly of storing up earthly treasures. History and experience add their testimony to the wisdom of the words of Jesus. Ages past have known many men that were tremendously rich. Some of the ancient monarchs of the East might have made our modern millionaires look like paupers in comparison, but of what value were their earthly treasures, after all? Solomon's annual income has been computed to have been about five million pounds, and yet his testimony concerning all his earthly treasures was that "all was vanity and vexation of spirit."

Recently a former coal baron of Western Pennsylvania passed to his eternal reward. At one time he was a millionaire with immense holdings and was looked upon

as the foremost man of the region. His palace and its spacious grounds constituted the show place of the community. But in the course of years all was changed, and he died a virtual pauper, with tremendous liabilities but only comparatively inconsequential assets. He had laid up great treasures upon earth, but the moth and rust and thieves, in a figurative sense, had robbed him of them all. It is true indeed that "riches certainly make themselves wings; they fly away as an eagle toward heaven."

How much better, then, to heed the Saviour's command to lay up for ourselves "treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal!" Heavenly treasures are safe and secure. They are sound investments. The bank of heaven never fails. We shall, of course, only realise their full value in the "sweet by and by," but we can enjoy them already here and now, for with our affection set upon things above we have a joy that we can never have if our hearts are dwarfed by being set upon the fleeting treasures of earth.

Be careful where you have your treasure, for your affection will be at the same place. "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth."

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
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
