

Introduction to Bible Study articles:

Profitable Bible Study

By Pastor FREDERICK G. CLOKE (Elim Church, Southport)

☐ IBLE study is absolutely necessary to a vigorous Christian life. The tragedy of the twentieth century is that the Church, having neglected the Word of God, has become a prey to Higher Criticism and Modernism. Thousands of Christians have been overthrown in these days of Bible Criticism because they have not known their Bibles; thousands more are being robbed of much blessing because they neglect the study of the inspired volume.

The Bible needs no scholarly introduction to its pages—no specialised education. It was written for the people and the people can, by diligent study, understand every page. The only qualification to this statement is that there are certain conditions of mind and heart necessary to the profitable study of God's Word, and we anticipate that these are already appreciated by the reader. A desire to know God's will and a readiness to obey it, is a first necessary. A simple faith in the Bible as the inspired Word of God is also requisite. A prayerful and reverent approach to the Bible and the diligent application of the mind, will elicit pleasure and profit in the study of the sacred Word.

Profitable Bible study is not a casual surface reading of the Scriptures, for God does

NOT ENCOURAGE LAZINESS

or condone superficiality, and such reading will produce very little profit. The Christian who desires to become thoroughly acquainted with the Divine Library must be prepared to study diligently, earnestly applying the mind. This is the only way in which to derive pleasure and profit from Bible study.

Some method for the systematic study of the Word of God is certainly necessary. Nothing destroys the value of Bible reading, makes it unprofitable and robs it of pleasure, more than reading it in little bits, picking out fragments here and there, or selecting portions haphazardly. It is the only Book in the world that is subjected to this kind of thing and it is an abuse of the sacred, precious Book. These are strong words and

the statement is dogmatic, but it is necessary to register one's protest against this widespread practice. A chapter in the morning with one eye on the clock, a chapter at night, selected at random and read when the eyelids are heavy and the mind tired and weary: is this a conscientious way of reading this Divine revelation that God has given to us and preserved by a thousand miracles? There are several methods for the systematic study of the Bible, each in its way effective and useful; but the best and most important method, and the one which should take precedence of many others is the synthetic method. Other methods may follow, but the

SYNTHETIC MUST BE FIRST,

The word "synthetic" is derived from two Greek words meaning, placing together; viz., syn which means "together," and thesis which means "placing." Each book of the Bible is a complete discussion of a single subject. There is a full river of truth running through each Bible book and when this is discovered, every rivulet, stream, and brook in the book will be seen to run into it, increasing its flow. Synthesis is the method that shows this to be a fact. A particular Bible book is not a collection of several subjects thrown together in haphazard fashion, needing to be sorted; each book deals with one subject in an orderly and systematic manner. It will easily be seen, then, that Synthesis is the opposite to Analysis. To analyse, each part of a book is taken out and separated for study, but when applying the synthetic method each part is seen in perfect order and position. The great advantage of this method of study can be quickly appreciated. It supplies a comprehensive grasp of the great subjects of the Bible, it is a protection against the text-snatcher, it provides an answer to the alleged inconsistencies and contradictions of the Scriptures. The student sees the plan and purpose of the book, discovers the link in its relative parts, and sees its relation to other Bible books,

thus showing that the Bible itself is not a miscellany, but a whole work that admits of

NO ADDITION OR SUBTRACTION.

After this method it is easy to follow up with the microscopic method, and get the correct interpretation, because its position in the whole context is known.

Choose a particular book for study and read it through at one sitting. If it is read through several times the main truth of the book will become apparent, and in continuing to do so it will be found that not only is the reader grasping its contents, but the contents are grasping the reader. If any portion seems to be out of line with the argument or purpose of the book, the mind should be diligently applied to that particular portion and although this may mean hard work in the study of the Word, it will be abundantly rewarded by the enrichment of the mind and heart. Knowledge of the Word that is easily obtained can be just as easily lost, but knowledge of the Word that is obtained by hard, diligent, and personal study becomes yours, a lasting possession. The book should be read independently, and too much emphasis cannot be placed upon this point. Read no commentary or other work upon the book and consider no teaching upon it, until you have mastered it, or at least endeavoured to do so. Believe in the ministry of the Holy Spirit as Teacher and Illuminator. Other works may prove helpful after personal and private study, when error can be judged, mistakes corrected, wrong conclusions rejected, and proffered help from other readers and students received with safety because God's Word is in the mind and

heart. Give God's pure Word FIRST PLACE IN MIND AND HEART.

Have faith in the English Bible. Our Bible is of course a translation, and translations can be inaccurate, but we have in the English Bible the finest translation possible. The text of this Bible has been purified under God's guidance and blessing, and is accurate. The finest scholars have given us the King James version of 1611 and the Revised Version of 1884. There is such wonderful accord between these two versions that no doctrine of the English Bible is altered, and only a very few passages in the entire work are affected. There are many other translations into the English tongue, but although the form of the language varies, the truth remains the same. The writer uses several translations, but when the authority of a passage is in dispute he relies upon the Authorised and Revised versions. So then, your Bible is reliable, it is God's Word and it cannot be neglected without loss and even tragedy. It is the greatest thing in the world; to it we owe our salvation, and it has given to us our place and privileges as an Empire and nation. Our fathers suffered and died for it and we are unworthy children and fail God if we neglect, abuse, or undervalue it.

The week after next we are commencing the Synthetic study of the Epistle to the Galatians, and the principle of refusing other works until the book has been thoroughly read and considered should be applied to the Bible course thus provided. Read the Galatian epistle during the next fortnight as much as possible, each day giving a little prayerful, diligent study to this important book and then be ready to profit by the course.

The Art of Wonder.

If the moon only shone in all its glory once in a generation, the world would spend millions to view its splendour, and never think of sleep while it lasted. Yet now they turn over and pull the blind down with a grumble because its beams have roused them from slumber. When did you last catch your breath at the beauty of a bird's plumage, or the sparkling freshness of a spring morning? If you have not, you are losing the art of wonder, which is the portal of the gate called "Praise," leading up to the chancel of worship. It is a wonderful exercise for the spirit to see something in the common things about us for which we may give thanks. Colour will be found in drab streets, and beauty in mud puddles; and so God will be discovered where least expected. Copy the Psalmist and find the sunlight of surprise in the everyday things of life (Psa. viii.).

Moral Responsibility.

In a recent coroner's court, he had some plain things to say to one of the witnesses. The facts were as follows:

Two young men aged about seventeen had gone out fishing, one got into difficulties in the middle of a pond. The companion, who could not swim, called a man to help who admitted he was told there was a boy in the water who could not swim. He saw the boy was a good way out. He walked away and, meeting a girl, asked her if she could swim, but she could not. He did not walk into the water.

The Coroner: "You did not even try to go in even up to your knees? I quite agree you are not called on to risk your life, but for all you know you might have been able to walk in a long way. You might not have been able to do anything, but you did not even try."

Witness: "I had my wife with me. She nearly fainted."

The coroner, recording a verdict of death by misadventure, said: "The witness seemed to be in a hurry to go away, and as it turned out he could not have done much. At the same time, I feel something more might have been done, rather than walk away. That is for his own conscience to decide."

If such hard words are addressed to a man who did not help to rescue a boy from ordinary death, what will the Judge of all the earth have to say to us who not only know the message of life can save, but who also know how? Men are perishing for need of the news of Christ, what are you doing about it? How will you be able to face the Judge? Read Ezekiel xxxiii. 1-11.

ITS PRESENT POSITION AND PROSPECTS No. 3. By Pastor T. A. CARVER

Spain's Fearful Martyrdom (Part 2)

AST week's article traced the outline of events that led to the Fascist revolt in Spain, resulting in one of the most appalling civil wars in history. That the Papacy was the cause of this fearful carnage, no impartial observer can deny, but if any doubts were in the public mind at the outbreak, subsequent events soon dispelled them and proclaimed to the whole world that the barbarous campaign waged by the Fascist forces was nothing less than a "Holy Crusade" by Mother Church for the extermination of every principle opposed to the will of Rome.

One of the first things that happened in this country was a spontaneous campaign on the part of the popish newspapers to try and poison the minds of English people against the Spanish Government. They were denounced as Reds, Atheists, Bolshevists, etc., and in turn, papers such as The Universe acclaimed Franco as the "Christian" General who was fighting the powers of hell to "save Christianity in Spain." Lurid accounts were given of the alleged atrocities by the "Reds" to inflame the public spirit against the legitimate Government, whilst the atrocities of the Fascists were

PASSED BY IN SILENCE.

In fact, after reading The Universe for several weeks, I was left with no option but to believe that Franco was a master-saint and the whole of his army was composed of lesser saints, incapable of any brutality or outrage. Other Romanist papers were not far behind, but vied with each other for the most extravagant accounts of how Franco's soldiers attended "Holy" Mass before their butchering expeditions, and how, on capturing any town, the first act on entering was to celebrate this infamous sacrifice. Funds were opened by these various papers and the readers were instructed to send in their gifts to help the "Christian" forces in their great struggle. The Catholic Times' (13th November, 1936) published an account of arrangements for Franco's triumphant entry into Madrid, which however, did not take place till more than two years later.

"Franco's first public act after quelling the Red terror in Madrid will be to escort on foot the Blessed Sacrament on its triumphal return to the Spanish capital. . . . Thirty bands will play the Royal March in honour of the Sacred Heart. . . . Every day for a week special masses of thanksgiving will be offered. . . For forty-eight consecutive hours there will be Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in

the Royal Palace."

Concerning this "noble Christian" General, let me quote the words of a prominent Romanist, John McGovern, M.P.: "I went to the Front at Madrid. . . . I saw Italian airmen blowing defenceless people

to smithereens by bomb and machine gun. . . . I saw the limbs of women and children being dug out. I saw the blood-saturated clothing in their beds. I saw children's heads being boxed in the mortuary. This is Franco's fight for Christianity" ("Why the Bishops back Franco," p. 1).

Not only were the churches used as ammunition dumps manned by Fas-

cists, but evidence is also available that in many churches, before a Republican retreat, lists of names were left of those who were to be put to death when the Fascists took the town. In a splendid book, Spanish Harvest, by a valiant missionary, Lydia de Wertz tells on page 127 of "ten intrepid young Christians "who were stoned, kicked and beaten and finally shot because they refused to confess to the priest.

The horrible massacre of Badagos is known to all. The News Chronicle (17th August, 1936) stated: "A red blood-stained wall at the Commandancia, perforated with bullets, shows the grim spot where 2,000 men were executed by the insurgents." The Daily Express (15th August, 1936) stated: "At Almendralejo the rebels are reported to have executed more than a thousand militiamen, including a hundred women." At the rebel capture of Prienti Genil "1,700 workers were executed " (The People, 23rd August, 1936). "At Rio Tinto over 1,000 miners were shot." (The Times, 17th November, 1936).

And what did the Pope have to say? Nothing except to declare to the world that "a new saviour had arisen in Spain, comparable to the great deliverers of the past." Yet this was the man whom the world, in its post-mortem verdict, declared was "Pius the Peace-

But the "Christian" General, in spite of the

INFALLIBLE BLESSING OF THE POPE,

did not find it an easy task to conquer the ill-prepared workers, and so outside help was necessary. Chief support came from Italy and Germany, in both arms and men. And here perhaps a word may be necessary regarding apparent Romish intrigue in the British Government. These are the words of Mr. Albert Close, in the Churchman's Magazine, July, 1938:

The whole British Empire has been fed on false news for the last two years. The Foreign Office has denied all knowledge of the landing of 60,000 Italian troops and 12 Generals in Spain. These figures were given in Parliament "The Times," March 24th, 1937, and June 14th, 1937). Is it possible to believe that with Lord Perth in Italy for three years as British Ambassador, and Mr. Ogilvie Forbes in Spain as British Minister, neither of them knew about the vast Italian armies and equipment leaving the ports of Italy, traversing in transports 1,500 miles of the Mediterranean Sea and Atlantic to fight for Franco and the Church? Does any sane man believe they did not know of the landing. of 60,000 Italians in Spain? Both these Ministers are Romanists, . . . Naturally they wanted Franco and the Roman Church to win in Spain, and little doubt, coloured their reports to the King and Foreign Office accordingly.
. . . In answer after answer in the House of Commons during 1936-37 Mr. Eden said he had no knowledge of the landing of large bodies of Italian troops in Spain, yet independent authorities reported sighting the transports at sea, and seeing the troops landing. On March 20th, 1937, we read the truth in our morning papers. The Government, troops had won a great victory over the insurgents, and had defeated two Italian Divisions, and had captured nearly all their guns and equipment. In the House of Commons on March 23rd, 1937, Mr. Lloyd George stated, when reproaching the Foreign Office for concealing the facts, that there were actually four divisions of Italian troops (60,000 men) in Spain. . . . Either the British Ministers deceived Sir Samuel Hoare, Mr. Eden, and Lord Halifax in their reports from Italy and Spain, or on the other hand the Foreign Office deceived the nation.

But beside Fascist aid, Franco also brought over

THOUSANDS OF MOORS

to assist him. It had taken Spain over eight centuries to drive them out of Spain; now they were brought back to help slaughter the loyal Spaniards. The popish press in this country had a wonderful fairy story ready. They told their readers that these infidel Moors had been so impressed by the benefits of "Christianity" under General Franco that they wished of their own accord to assist in "re-converting" Spain! Shades of Anderson and Grimm!

These infidels were then armed with rifles bearing the badge of the Sacred Heart and ammunition bags stamped with the Sacred Host. A Bishop addressed them near Burgos and, blessing them, declared: "You will have a special place in Paradise for your part in this struggle." Actual photographs of these things were produced by the Romanist Mr. John McGovern.

As for the atrocities committed by these Moors, they are almost unmentionable. "On the Talavera front, the captured militia girls were turned over to the Moors, one girl to twenty Moors" (News Chronicle, 16th November, 1936). In other places, the Fascists took young women from their parents and handed them over to murderous Moors, saying, "Your grand-children won't be Reds."

And all this was done in the name of a Christian Church! And the so-called "pope of peace" raised not a single protest, but rather blessed the perpetrators of these outrages.

Then, when after two and a half years of slaughter and bloodshed, the rising Spain had been crushed, the new Pope imitated the principles of his predecessor and sent a telegram of congratulation to the "Christian" conqueror: "Lifting up our hearts to the Lord, we give sincere thanks with your Excellency for

SPAIN'S DESIRED CATHOLIC VICTORY,

We express our vows that your beloved country, peace attained, may undertake with new vigour the ancient Christian traditions which made her great. With affectionate sentiments we send your Excellency and the whole noble Spanish people our Apostolic blessing."

And what now of the future of Spain? There is only one answer. Protestantism will be crushed once again, and the old tyranny of Rome re-established. That this is evident may be proved by quoting from a book just published in Fascist Spain: "Que es 'Lo Nuevo'?" ("What is 'the new spirit'?"), which has been regarded as the Bible of Nationalist Spain.

"We must be absolutely intolerant of ideologies and opinions contrary to the Catholic Religion, and their propaganda must be absolutely and decisively banned in all its forms" (p. 94). Then as consequences of a Fascist Catholic state it lists the following:

- (1) The Catholic Religion must be declared the official religion of the State.
- (2) No teaching will be permitted against the Catholic religion, neither in official establishments nor in private.
- (3) No proselytism, public or private, will be allowed in favour of other religions.
- (4) No public worship of any other religion will be permitted.
- (5) All laws of the Church as they are expressed in the existing canonical code, will be recognised as included organically in the juridical statute of the Spanish State.
- (6) The Church will be given effective watch over Spanish education, press, and printing in dogmatic matters (p. 70).

There is much more of this style, but enough has been written to show that once again the papal night has descended upon poor Spain, and unless God intervenes in a miraculous manner, the Truth is doomed to a fearful and brutal extinction. If ever Spanish Christians needed our prayers, it is to-day. May the Lord have mercy upon His saints and deliver them in the fearful time that seems to lie ahead!

"COME, LORD JESUS!"

ERY great emphasis is due to be laid on the imminence of the coming of our Lord to take away His prepared people, whom He has been ripening in secret. It is true that He is waiting until the last soul, who shall make up the number of His elect, shall be gathered in, and "who shall be used to bring in this last soul?" may be asked. May we not add that He may be waiting also the result of the last test of patience or endurance, the last witness for Him of a meek spirit under almost impossible provocation, the last silence under a bitter wrong, the last martyr-death or martyr-life of a heathen convert, the last faithful witness of one of His own in an ungodly family—a son, a daughter, or a servant—the last right thing done for His sake at the cost of persecution,

loss of money or reputation: ere the last joint of the supply (Eph. iv. 16) has come into perfect working order in the Body of Christ?

The building up of the body of Christ has taken nearly two thousand years, and only one Hand, using many instruments, has formed it. "We are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (Eph. ii. 10). Chosen in Christ "before the foundation of the world" (Eph. i. 4); and created in Christ, in Him partaking of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption which is in the world through lust (II. Peter i. 4): "heirs of God and jointheirs with Christ, if so be that we suffer with Him, that we may be also glorified together."—Sel.

REVIVAL SCENES AT SWANSEA

82 Decisions and Remarkable Healings at Pastor G. I. Francis's Meetings. By Pastor W. J. HILLIARD

SCENES reminiscent of the 1904 revival have again been witnessed in this district during the short series of special meetings conducted by Pastor Gwilym I. Francis. In spite of brilliant summer weather and the appeal of the seaside, hundreds flocked to the Elim Tabernacle, preferring the message of the Second Coming of Jesus Christ, to the sunshine and sea breezes of Swansea Bay and the Gower Peninsular. The special services lasted for just over one week—but what a week! Crowds, conversions, healings were the order of almost every meeting. All classes and conditions of people were represented, many coming several miles to hear more of the Lord's imminent return, and others to seek healing.

Among those attending the services was an Indian princess—the Maharanee Chindrawati Ma Saheb Holkar of Indore. Hearing of the miraculous cases of healing in the Northants village of Aldwincle, her interest was aroused and she came to Swansea to meet the revivalist. Together with her lady-in-waiting, secretary, and nurse, she came to several of the services, and when the invitation was given

to be anointed and prayed for for healing. Before leaving for a tour of France, Her Highness testified to healing and expressed her delight in the services. After hearing an explanation of Divine Healing by Pastor Francis, medicines were dispensed with alto-

gether, and she trusted God implicitly for complete deliverance. The campaign singing thrilled her, particularly the chorus which was such a favourite during the mission: "I know He is wonderful," and the old Gospel hymn: "There is a fountain filled with blood." Many others also testified to healing. A little deaf

and dumb girl was able to say: "Jesus," "Mamma," "Dadda," and "Pastor." A lady at the first healing meeting jumped to her feet to testify to the fact that she could now open and

shut her hand, which she had not been able to do for a long time. Another woman, carried into the meeting, was able to walk up and down the aisle, and at the close left the church unaided. A little girl discarded leg-irons and came to the next service wearing a new pair of shoes—the first for several years. Many others testified to being healed of deafness and other ailments.

On looking over the happy faces of the splendid congregations, one could do nothing else but admit that the preaching of the Gospel is still a mighty attraction. Pastor Francis's thrilling addresses on "The Signs of the Times" will long be remembered by those privileged to attend. They proved a means of

GREAT BLESSING AND INSPIRATION

to God's people, and of salvation to the sinners, for in all eighty-two people publicly signified their acceptance of Jesus Christ as Saviour. Thirty-five of these were saved at the afternoon and evening services on the Thursday.

The last meeting on the Sunday will live in the minds of both revivalist and people. The building was packed to its utmost capacity before the time advertised to commence, and when Pastor Francis arose to take charge of the service, the aisles, pulpit steps, window-sills, minor hall, and vestibule were filled as well. In fact, all available space in the entire building was occupied. The meeting did not finish until nearly ten o'clock, and even then people were still singing, "I know He is wonderful," and could we blame them? Many of them were fit and well after ailing for years; others were revelling in the new-found joy of sins forgiven and peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Pastor Francis has gone, but we shall continue to remember him in prayer, that people in other towns will come to find the Lord Jesus as wonderful as we have in Swansea during this brief campaign.

INDIAN PRINCESS "MUCH IMPROVED"

Her Highness, the Maharanee Chindrawati Ma Saheb Holkar of Indore, left Swansea to-day for London, "very much improved in health" in the words of her secretary, Mr. C. Saragon.

The Maharanee has been in Swansea for six days. She came to the town to meet Pastor Gwilym I. Francis, Elim Foursquare Gospel evangelist. She has been staying at the Metropole Hotel, and Pastor Francis was among the party at lunch with the Maharanee at the Hotel to-day, before her departure.

Mr. Saragon, in an interview with an "Evening Post" reporter, said that after attending her first service at the Elim Tabernacle last Sunday, the Maharanee felt real relief. "Next morning we did not give her medicines," he said.

"On Tuesday and yesterday she attended services, this morning in her own words she 'sprang out of bed,' I can say that decidedly she is better."

The Maharanee intends to go to Paris from London, and then tour France.



Sunday, July 2nd. II. Cor. xii. 1-15. "My grace is sufficient for thee" (verse 9).

Most of us have often besought God to deliver us from trying things. Perhaps He has not granted our request. We still have to work with difficult people, labour under misunderstandings, perform tasks naturally distasteful to us. But let us not fret or murmur. His grace is sufficient for us. Without Him we might well be despondent, but as we accept by faith the glorious promise, "My grace is sufficient for thee," we may, like tree-climbers who use the notches in the wood as steps to higher boughs, use all our trying experiences to lift us higher up the ladder of Christlikeness.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Monday, July 3rd. II. Cor. xiii. 1-14. "Be of good comfort" (verse 11).

These words are essentially for those who know the Lord. To tell an un-believer in trouble to "be of good comfort" would be useless. There is no man-made cistern from whence he can draw the soothing draught his spirit needs. With Christians it is different. Circumstances may discourage, trials assail us, but in Christ we have a neverfailing source of comfort. Tuesday, July 4th. Ezra i. 1-11.

"The Lord God of heaven hath given me all the kingdoms of the earth"

It is to the honour of Cyrus, conqueror of Babylon, and founder of the Persian Empire, that he acknowledged his rulership to be by God's permission. What a difference if all the rulers of the earth to-day would do the same! But whatever their attitude, the fact remains that they do only hold their power by God's sufferance. They can take no step unless He allows. They cannot prevent God's plans moving to their consumma-tion. We must not let present gloom blind our eyes to future glory. The day of our exaltation will come. Tears shall be dried, sorrows removed, and perfect,

eternal joy be ours. May the radiance of this vision illuminate our path to-day. The kingdoms of this world shall yet become the kingdoms of our God and of His Christ.

PRAYER TOPIC:

The power of the Holy Spirit to rest upon God's children as they meet together for the monthly Day of Prayer.

Wednesday, July 5th. Ezra iii, 1-13. "The people gathered themselves to-

gether as one man to Jerusalem " (v. 1). This chapter speaks of the Israelites who had returned from captivity seeking God. Notice three things: (1) They were moved by fear. "Fear was upon them" (v. 3). It is good to seek God even through fear, though we must not forget Him, as many do, afterwards.
(2) They sought according to His will.
"As it is written in the law of Moses" (v. 2). We must approach God aright, depending upon Christ's blood, with no unconfessed sin in the heart, without enmity against anyone. (3) They were united. "As one man" (v. 1). What power there is in united effort! Let us never be the cause of breaking the unity between believers.

PRAYER TOPIC:
That the Holy Spirit may pour comfort into the hearts of all those who are bereaved.

Thursday, July 6th. Ezra iv. 1-10. "Ye have nothing to do with us to

build an house unto our God " (verse 3). It was a wise step to refuse the aid of foreigners in the building of the temple. Strangers could have no part in such a sacred matter. The Christian Church would have done well to follow this example. Her sad state to-day is due in a large measure to the unregenerate men who have been allowed to dominate her. God's work demands God's men. The human tendency is to judge men by their talents, position, appearance. But God looks on the heart. We may have but few natural endowments, yet if our heart is right with Him, and we are obediently seeking to do His will, then we need not worry; He will use us for His glory.

PRAYER TOPIC: That the Elim publications may be made a blessing to all who read them.

Friday, July 7th. Ezra iv. 11-24.

"Then ceased the work of the house of God" (verse 24).

There are times when Satan seems to have things all his own way. This was just such an occasion. Through the jealousy of wicked men the temple-builders must lay down their tools. "Why does God allow such things?" we ask. Sometimes we find the answer; at others it eludes us. This is not because there is no answer, but because God chooses to keep it from us for the present. He does so to teach us to

"trust Him where we cannot trace Him." Do not be discouraged by your perplexing circumstances. Perhaps they are God's answer to your prayer for greater faith.

PRAYER TOPIC:

Saturday, July 8th. Ezra v. 1-17.

Many people excel at telling others to do things, but are slow to lend a hand themselves. Not so with Haggai and Zechariah; they were workers as well as preachers. Let us follow their example. When we think to-day of the Christless masses, the suffering, the lonely, instead of simply saying, "Something ought to be done for them," let us ask ourselves, "What can I do?" God will show us something we can do, but it may cut right across our personal inclination. Nevertheless, if we accept the challenge, we shall prove the sufficiency of His grace, and carry His joyous peace to hungry hearts.

"Slabbing" Crooked Logs.

At the sawmill the sawyer makes crooked logs straight. He does it by "slabbing" the four sides. But upon investigation we would find the hearts of the logs just as crooked as they were before they were slabbed by the sawyer. Here is a man who says, "I have been in the habit of swearing, I will saw that off. I have been in the habit of cheating, I will saw that off." 6. How else can Britain and other nations in their mad plunge hellward be quickly arrested? (Acts xvii. 30; xxvi. 16-20).

7. How else can the sensitive impulses of the Head of the Body be unerringly transmitted to the members of the Body? (Acts xxii. 14; xxvii. 23, 24).

Can you think of a single scriptural reason for not praying for revival of the Body of Christ? Reader, if you are a member of Christ's Body and walking with Him, how else can you have peace except by ardently praying and constantly striving for that which is according to the will of the Head?

How else "can two walk together except they be agreed?" Surely therefore you must—

Prophecy versus Fatalism

The Christian's Attitude to Evil

By Evangelist G. CANTY

PROPHECY is foreign to fatalism. In no degree does it sanction immediate resignation to predicted evil, and forbid resistance. Some have maintained that, intended or not, prophecy is inseparable from fatalism. An oracular forecast of evil, they declare, is certain to produce it, and destroy every normal ambition to prevent the evil foretold.

So much, however, is not to be admitted as a fact, though it cannot be denied that it exists as a danger: or perhaps even that can be modified. It may be said that this danger lies not so much in prophecy, as in a complete absorption in the subject: it is the exclusion of other Christian themes that produces the real trouble. The mistake is not in knowing prophecy, or too much prophecy, but in unfamiliarity with the practical ideals of Scripture, such as "love one another." Providing ethical principles balance prophetical views a correct attitude to predicted evils will be maintained. More briefly, the heart must be as full as the head. Our immediate object is to present a warning against the attitude caused by this pre-occupation with prophecy, an attitude which permits

EVIL WITHOUT A PROTEST

because it happens to be pre-recorded.

Just here it would be advisable to point out that there are two main channels of prophecy. One divine -the Scriptures; the other naturally ordered-events. Most happenings are forecast by other happenings-"Coming events cast their shadows before them." They are portents rather than prophecies. Now we mention this because fatalism can be produced by this form of prophecy just as by the other. Men make the same fundamental mistake in both cases, viz., to sit down as soon as they see the signs of coming evil and say, "What is to be will be." Evil, whether foreshadowed in Scripture or events, must always be opposed. What follows here is proof that this is the only reasonable attitude to adopt. However, it would confuse the issue to deal with both forms of prophecy in parallel, even though the error made is the same; hence only passing attention is here paid to the teaching of events. So we discuss the principle of attempting the postponement of evil which is divinely prophesied. Is it permissible?

First, if it is unlawful to oppose one predicted evil, the same holds good of other predicted evils, and if we can oppose one evil we can oppose all. A simple fact which is apparently overlooked by many, for while no opposition is made in some cases other predicted wrongs are vehemently protested against! Suppose we find one resigned fatalistically to some wrong because he finds it foretold in the Bible. Very well, let that one maintain the same attitude towards other wrongs, e.g., Matthew xxiv. 12: "The love of many

shall wax cold." He must regard the prophecy as a veto on revival! A backsliding church or brother should not be prayed for! Or again, I. Timothy iv. 1: "Some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits... speaking lies in hypocrisy." Then modernism, spiritism,

lying, and hypocrisy, being prophesied, may not be opposed? Their victims are beyond hope of salvation? Thus the attitude is palpably wrong. We do pray and labour to check these things, and properly so, as all will agree. Then whatever else of ungodliness is foretold must also be resisted similarly. War, famine, pestilences, distress, and every kind of trouble predicted for the last days is to be minimised or striven

against as far as possible.

We might further convince ourselves by carrying the principle to its logical conclusion. If we are not to resist anything, then that thing is desirable. If I am told not to turn away a caller, the household evidently desires his company, so I shall invite him in. Now if I am not to pray against an evil, I can only assume that evil is wanted. So those who refuse to oppose sin because it is foretold, make prophecy the occasion by which sin is to be welcomed! Either good or bad must be patronised, as Jesus taught us. Then what evil do you refuse to oppose? War? Social problems? National distress? Then those things should be your desires! Help to create them. But this will not do; obviously something is wrong. A principle which produces such ill in its extreme applications, is,

WRONG FROM THE BEGINNING

Evil must always be opposed.

Note, too, that prophecy is a revelation of God's foreknowledge, and not of His will. No one surely imagines that foreknowledge affects my moral duty or lessens the capability of crime? Foreseen or not, wrong is wrong, just as right remains right. I am just as much obliged to regard sin as sin and oppose it as such, whether it has been foreseen or not. If I see a man not objecting against sin, on the ground that it was prophesied, the kindest thought one can spare him is that he thinks the sin was foreordained and planned by God. In no other circumstance would he, as a Christian, be favourable to sin. But surely by such an action a man would be declaring that God schemes evil!

Remember, indifference to wrong identifies us with the wrongdoer. It is one of the most equitable measures of justice to arraign not only the perpetrator of a crime but anyone who, though able to oppose it, does not. He is an accomplice because he did not do all in his power to hinder the criminal. In this country an unlocked door can incur a conviction. We are not taking all steps possible to prevent crime. Have you refused to help turn back evil? Perhaps you would not pray for a peaceful settlement during the last crisis for example? Then you are to be regarded as an accessory in the act. Your protest that it is useless to stand against predicted evil is met by Jesus' words: "Evil must needs come, but woe unto

him by whom it cometh." God's preknowledge does not excuse you—that is a mere subtlety.

What is more, indifference to wrong overlooks the fact that we are "the salt of the earth." Our purpose is preservative. We are on earth as the influence against moral decay. Even if these are the last days and the

EVILS WHICH SURROUND US

are prophetical evils, we are still on earth too, as salt. Evidently we can do a little in that capacity or God would have translated us. If it were useless to stand against the evils prophesied we should not be left. It does not need vast reasoning powers to see we may still hinder corruption a little. Our presence among it proves that. Let us rather beware lest the salt lose its saltness.

Further, indifference to wrong is incompatible with Christ's new law—love. We are taught that given perfect love we can practically ignore all codes of conduct. We shall fulfil the law without knowing it. I can safely put prophetical subtleties to one side then, and view my behaviour from the view-point of love. Does it conform with love? Yes? Then it is right. No? It is wrong. Is opposition to evil congruous with love? Yes. Then it is right. If any other doctrine of Scripture teaches me to do otherwise, then it is patent I do not understand it rightly. I am making some mistake if my study of prophecy leads me to take no steps against sins of war, evils of political disorders, wrongs of social inequities.

Finally, a question. How should we act when evils, prophesied by Scripture or events, seem to be coming upon us? What we have said already prompts the answer that all evil must be steadfastly opposed until we can do so no longer. But Scripture has much to say in corroboration of this opinion. There is the case of David as recorded in II. Samuel xii. He had a child which God said should die. The child became dangerously ill then. Nevertheless David did not resign himself to the evil.

Thankful for Weakness?

RE we thanking God for our weaknesses? We may well do so, if at the same time we thank Him for His strength. One thing that Moses knew he did not have was the gift of eloquence. When God told him to go to Pharaoh and demand that the children of Israel be allowed to go, Moses promptly reminded God: "O my Lord, I am not eloquent, neither heretofore, nor since Thou hast spoken unto Thy servant: but I am slow of speech, and of a slow tongue" (Exod. iv. 10). Came God's loving satire, "Who hath made man's mouth? . . . Now therefore go, and I will be with thy mouth, and teach thee what thou shalt say." Who knew better, Moses or God? Fifteen centuries later we read in the inspired record: "And Moses . . . was mighty in words and in deeds" (Acts vii. 22). The very thing that he knew was his great weakness became his great strength. Moses is the only man in the whole Bible to whom the Lord Jesus Christ is likened, and we read of Christ that He was "a prophet mighty in deed and word" (Luke xxiv. 19). So Moses, who said truly of himself that

FATALISM WAS ABSENT

from his conduct. He sought God for its recovery, persisting through seven days and nights until the child died. Then, and not till then, did he stop, for he said, "Who could tell whether the Lord would be gracious to me, that the child might live? " Again, lonah prophesied the overthrow of Nineveh. The King of Nineveh said as David said (ch. iii. 9): "Who can tell if God will turn and repent. . .?" Indeed the next verse says, "God saw their works . . . and God repented." Here it was not only lawful, but as subsequent events showed, it was also very profitable to oppose a prophesied evil. Then see Acts xxi. Paul was, told by a prophet at Cæsarea that he should be bound at Jerusalem. Yet his disciples strove to prevent the trouble prophesied. Only when they saw it useless did they bow to the inevitable and said, "The will of the Lord be done."

Other instances could be quoted, but there is no need. These show clearly that predictions of trouble must not be admitted until they have been fulfilled. H. W. Beecher says, "It is always lawful to strive against events. Apparent evils, although they may seem to us as inevitable, are to be resisted; and it is perfectly lawful to resist them with all our power in all lawful ways, no matter how certainly they seem to be descending upon us." Referring to all forms of prophecy, that sums up our proper attitude. "Wars and rumours of wars "-" no peace "-" famines and pestilences,"-every kind of modern trouble-these are prophesied no doubt, yet they are not to be permitted without the protest of prayer and effort. And similarly with the prophecy by events,—when failure seems constant, ambition always frustrated, loss of loved ones sure, bankruptcy imminent, refuse defeat until it comes. The portents are to be regarded as warnings only. Give in to no evil or trouble before it arrives, no matter how strong may be the signs and prophecies of its coming. "Who can tell whether God will be gracious? "

he was slow of speech and had a slow tongue, came to have an eloquence like that of the Son of God. What was the amazing secret? It was the secret that we can all know and use—letting God's strength replace our weakness. To Moses, and to Paul, and to every child of God comes the Lord's wonderful word: "My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness." Are we ready to answer by faith and in thanksgiving: "Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, . . . for when I am weak, then am I strong "? (II. Cor. xii. 9, 10). So let us thank God for our weaknesses; and the next time some weakness looms before us as insurmountable, let us hear God saying to us what He said to Moses: "Now shalt thou see what I will do" (Exod. vi. 1).

How short the time to suffer and to sacrifice in the service of souls, how paltry will things look at the judgment seat of Christ!


Pavne, and Mr. J. Davies (Finchley). We thank God for such times of fellowship and blessing.

Seemingly Right—but Wrong

SOME people do wrong ignorantly. Anyone, while not aware of some particular regulation, might very easily contravene it, altogether unwittingly. A person might do many a thing contrary to some by-law or ruling, without being conscious in the least that he was acting amiss. There could be no blame attached to such action, although it might bring about some disastrous result.

Or again, a man might travel in a certain direction, thinking he was going in the right way, and still be going astray. Of course action of this sort is different from deliberate and wilful wrongdoing. "Keep back Thy servant also," prays the Psalmist, "from presumptuous sins." To sin wilfully is worse than to sin ignorantly; and those who do wrong, knowing it to be wrong, sin against light and conscience.

"There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." A way may seem right and still be wrong. It may seem to lead upward into life, but instead it actually leads downward into death.

Mistaken action may lead to terrible consequences, even though the action were believed, at the time, to be right. A way seemingly right may be eternally wrong, and hence the necessity for extreme caution. To do wrong and suffer for it, is bad enough; but to do wrong, thinking it to be right, and suffer for it, is pathetically worse.

Applying this truth to matters of salvation, we find there are ways which do seem to be right, quite right to a man, but which lead ultimately to eternal death. The fact of their apparent rightness, makes the matter all the more serious, and does not obviate the final loss.

For instance, how perfectly right seems to men to be the idea that good people go to heaven when they die. As a matter of fact "none is good, save One, that is, God," but the thought in men's minds is that if a man has done good, lived a clean life, been a good neighbour and shown himself ready to help the less fortunate, he cannot miss heaven. Surely that is all a man can do, and it seems to be right that such good living will insure eternal life. So let a man do the best he can, be kind, considerate, courteous, thoughtful, and honest, and he will arrive safely in heaven at last. Indeed it would seem right to ask, that if a person of that type does not get to heaven whoever can? Truly this seems to be right reasoning and a correct outlook, and so much so that it would be well-nigh impossible, humanly speaking, to convince some people to the contrary. Nevertheless it is all wrong. "Doing the best you can" leads to the ways of eternal death.

" Doing is a deadly thing Doing ends in death."

This is a way which ends in death and destruction. On one occasion the writer was staying in a beautiful resort with a friend, and after supper we went out for a walk together. After going some distance we began to circle round towards home, and being under the impression that our way lay in a certain direction. we expressed ourselves with conviction. Our friend said otherwise, however, and although a certain way "seemed right" to the writer, he was quite wrong and the other was quite right. A man may think he knows the way to heaven, and that it lies along the path of kindly deeds and loving thoughts, but he is mistaken. Heaven cannot be gained by what you do, "for by grace are ye saved through faith; and

that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works lest any man should boast."

There are people who think that salvation lies at the end of religious formalism. "Be true to your religion," they say, "whatever your religion may be. Join some church and then be faithful to your obligation therein. Do what is expected of you, and pay your just dues." This also seems to be a right way, and some might honestly wonder what can be wrong with it. What are churches for, and what is religion for, but to get us to heaven, and if a man carefully fulfils the requirements of such what more can he do? Truth to tell this does seem the right way, but it is not: no, even though multitudes are travelling it in every land. It leads straight to eternal judgment, and because it seems to be right to a man, it is all the more dangerous.

Listen to what the Lord Jesus said on one occasion: "Many will say to Me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Thy name? and in Thy name have cast out devils? and in Thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from Me, ye that work iniquity."

These people of whom Christ spoke, were very religious and did religious work, but they were eternally lost. They were on the wrong way, which seemed right to them. Are you quite sure you may not be mistaken too? What if you are travelling to your doom and thinking meanwhile that you are on the right path? Won't you examine yourself? A way may seem right and not be right.

There is a way which IS right, and the end thereof are the ways of life, eternal life, satisfaction, heaven and God. On that way lies the glad commendation: "Well done, good and faithful servant: . . . enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

The question to be answered is, Are you sure you are on that way, the way which IS right? It is possible to be mistaken, all appearances to the contrary notwithstanding. Christ is the Way, the Only Way, the Living Way. If you would be saved you must look away from yourself and look to Jesus only. "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved."

Let Jesus save you, and do for you that which you cannot do for yourself. Cease at once from going about to establish your own righteousness and submit yourself unto the righteousness of God, "for Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to every one that believeth," and "if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." Máy He save you now!

" Nothing in my hands I bring; Simply to Thy Cross I cling."

or as another has written:

"In peace let me resign my breath And Thy salvation see. My sins deserve eternal death, But Jesus died for me."

May God help you to get the matter of salvation right, and to get, at once, into the way which IS right. Our ideas may be wrong. What God says stands. "For ye are all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus," and to "as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name."

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
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
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
