## A CONDITIONAL PROMISE

The Philippian Christians had been supplying Paul's umporal need Whate he was in Thessalonica they fadd "sent once and again unto his necessity" When he left Macedoma they were the only one who " communicated with him as concerning giving and receiving" Paul had real gratitucle in his heart He desired to repay then He was not able to do $n$, but he had a God who was able, and he did noc hesitate to assure them that God would amply repay them, that He would supply all therr " need aucording to His riches in glury by Christ Jesus * If we get into the centre of Gool's will and get all the selfishness out of our hearts, and endearour to further the interests of the work of God by manfesting an interest in God's workers in the home land and in the ends of the earth, God wall supply all our needs, whatever our needs may be We are accustomed to think of the promise as a promise to supply our tenporal need, but man's need is not only iemporal, it is physical, mental and spiritual And it is even more important that

## oUR spiritual need

be supplied than that our temporal, physual and mental need be met Our God will supply all the needs of His saints Let us look at man's spritual needs Man's spiritual need is sevenfold Man meeds

# Isaac Watts, Father of English Hymnody

IN 1674, a deacon of a Nonconformist Chureh in Southampton, England, was sentenced to a teim in prison. he, for conscience sake, having volated one of the unjust laws of the time relative to worslup During this time a son was born in liss humble lome, and the mother came often to sat on the prison steps, with the baby in her arms, to console her husband in his loneliness It was thus that the father of Isaac Watts first looked upon his little son-througli prison bars

Young Isaac was a precocious child and took to books almost before he could talk plainly He is sadd to have studied Latin at four and to have written verse at seien This aptitude for poetry was an outstanding gift, and he would often repeat $h_{11}$ couplets for the amusement of his elders The novelty of this wore off after a time, especially with the father, who tried to curb this

## poetic tendency,

to no aval Severe punishment was threatened, and the boy is reported to have pleaded for leniency wilh tears in his eyes and rhyme in his words

At eighteen he criticized the metrical psalms sung in the services of his father's church, and his father challenged him to write something better He accepted the challenge and durıng the week wrote his first hymn, a paraphase of Rev 5 6-12 It was sung the next Sunday evening, and others followed in rapid succession, being copied and sung from manuscript, until he had written over one hundred, when they were published This first hymn is still found in many standard hymn-books

> Behold the glories of the Lamb, Amidst His Father's throne, Prepare new honors for His Name, And songs before unknown

Isaac Watts 15 known as the " Father of English Hymnody "-not because he was the first to write hymns in English, for he was preceded by Joseph Addison, Bishop Ken, John Milton, and many others -but because of the number and quality of his hymns One of Watts' greatest accomplishments was his paraphrasing of all the Psalms Many of
these indeed, are classed with the hymns For example "Jesus shall retgn where'er the sun" is a versification of parts of Psalm lxxit In all his rendering of the Psalms he put his verse into New Testament language "I have expressed," he says," as I suppose David would have done had he lived in the days of Christianity "

During the one hundred and fifty years from the Reformation time to Watts's period, the Psalter was used almost exclusively in the worship of all Protestant countries, and many metrical versions were published It was his happy blending of the two streams of worship songs-psalms and hymns-that has given Watts his high place in the ranks of hymn writers " He was the first who succeeded in overcoming the prejudice which opposed the introduction of hymns into our public worship "

But it was not only as a pioneer that he was great $\mathrm{H}_{1 s}$ work remains In the hymn-books of every evangelical deriomination to-day we find from twentyfive to seventy-five of

stall used In the worship of the church notiong will ever supersede such hymns as

> "Am I a soldier of the Cross""
> "Come, let us join our cheerfui songs,"
> "There is a land of pure delight,"
> "O God, our Help in ages past,""
> "Alas ' and did my Saviour bleed""
> "From all that dwell below the skies"

And greatest of all-in the opinion of many the greatest hymn in the English language-" the masterpiece of impassioned contemplation"

When I survey the wondrous Cross
On which the Prince of Glory died,
My richest gain 1 count but loss,
And pour contempt on all my pride"
The devout spirit that breathes in all of Watts's hymns is found also in his literary and philosoplic works, so that the term, Seraphic Doctor, has been very fitly applied to him A great literary man wrote of his works " It is difficult to read a page without learning or at least wishing to be bctter. He that sat down to reason is on a sudden compelled to pray"

## A Remarkable Answer to Prayer

THL following incilent in the life of the late Mr Jay Gould, of a remarkable answer to prayer, is worthy of record I wish to relate it as it came to me, for the glory of God, and the encouragement of all Christaans to keep on praying For God will open the windows of heaven, even men's pochetbooks, some of which scem to be almost burglanproof, in answer to the prayer of fath

Mr Gould once left his easten home for a trip across the continent After visiting the Pacific States he returned by the southern route through Texas In the western part of that State the tran he was travelling on was halted for a few hours-at a little town to make needed repars on the engine While this was being done Mr Gould, to pass the timb, walked up the village strect to view the place and what was going on among the people On one corner a large crowd had gathered, as though something more than usual was taking place Mr Gould walked up, and found a sale going on, and

out, "Fousteen hundred and seventy-five dollats" He inquired of a man what was being sold, and was told that it was a new church house on which the contracting builder had a clamn for work It appeared that the limit of grace had been reached, as no one wished to rase the last $b d$ for the church house Mr. Gould, to heip on the sale, offered fifteen hundred dollars, which the auctioneer called a few times without a rasse, and it was sold to Jay Gould at his bid

A bill of sale was made out to him, and giving his cheque for the amount to the auctionees, he became the owner of the church property

Three grey-haired old men, standing near, watched the proceedings of the transfer, and going up to Mr Gould, not howing who he was, asked him what he intencled to do with the church he had just bought "What is it to you what I do with it ${ }^{\text {p }}$ It is mine now, to Reep or to give away, said the millionare One of the men sard "This is what it is to us We three men are

## TRUSTEES OF THAT GHURCH HOUSE,

and were sent here to see and then report what disposal was made of $1 t$, and in the church, at this present moment, the entire congregation, with the presiding elder and preachers, are down on their knees before the God of heaven, asking Him to interfere in some way to save our church, so that it may not be lost to us That is what it is to our people "

On imquiry this was learned to be the fact, when M1 Gould sard, "I beheve you good people have more need of the property than I have, and will make better use of it " He wrote out a bill of sale, signed lins full name to $1 t$, and handed it to the trustees, who were surprised to know that they were dealing with one of the wealthiest men in the world They most heartıly thanked him, bade him a warm, brotherly goodbye and a safe journey home, and with a kind

God bless you, the ruh man was gone
The three men hastened to the church and found the con $\quad$ regation singing prases to God for victory
Thes reported their great, and apparently miraculous success, and decided to write a formal letter of thanks to their generous millionarre benefactor Mr. Gould sometimes shewed this letter to his friends, and sery highly prized 1 t, for he satd it warmed his heat more than any million-dollar bond he ever had.

## Fresh Blessings in Ulster

GOD is wonderfully blessing the campaigns conducted by Principal George Jeffreys and the Revival Party in Northern Ireland and a great wave of revival is sweeping from place to place At the time of writing the Foursquare Gospel banner is flying over the City Hall, Armagh, where impressive scenes are being witnessed The following press report appeared in the Armagh Guardian on February 13th .

## DIVINE HEALING IN ARMAGH SCENES AT THE MEETINGS

"Scenes of great enthusiasm have been witnessed this week in the City Hall, Armagh, where Principal Jeffreys, of the Elim Foursquare Gospel Alhance, is conducting a revival and healing campaign Each night the large hall is crammed to to

even the platform being filled with people, many of whom come from five and ten and even fifteen miles away They come early, long before eight o'clock,
when the meetings are timed to begin, but time does not hang lieavy, for Mr Darragh, song leader of the campaign, starts community chorus singing as soon as there are sufficient present $1 t$ is singing, too, singing with heart and spirit and conviction behind it, and the leader is not content if he does not feel that everyone is taking part Roman Catholics were meluded in the audiences
" Prıncıpal Jeffreys enters at eight o'clock, and more hymns are sung and prayers are offered, and then the Principal, speaking with the earnestness of conviction of truth behind him, delivers his message He mahes no tangled exposition of fath, nor does he concern himself with unravelling dogmatic points of schism or sect, but

## HE PREACHES THE TRUTHं

of the Scripture, that the Christ who died is the only means of salvation After the address comes the appeal for converts, and each night while the great audience softly sings ' Just as I am,' hands are held up here and there in the hall as first one and then another feels the need for greater than human help

There is no coming out to a penitents' form, no button-noling, no coaxing-in fact, Principal Jeffreys Says that he dues not care to see people coming out on top of a wave of emotionalism, he wants them to come with an melligent grasp of the Truth

## THE POWER TO HEAL,

" After the pentents have been spoken to and told of prayer, Principal Jeffreys tells of the power of Cnrist to heal, in fact, it is probable that during his sermon he has spoken of it He does not clam any power to himself, says that he simply obeys the command in the 16th chapter of Mark-' Go ye into all the work, and preach the Cospel to every creature And these signs shall follow them that believe In My Name shall they cast out devils, they shall laty hands on the sick, and they shall recover'
"' I'ray, and trust God to heal,' says the Principal, and there come on to the platform, first in ones and 1 wos and then quichening numbers, a great crowd of people anxious to be reheved of sickness and mfirmity, old men on crutches, and young girls and hittle boys, even infants, young women and aged, they crowd up the steps until there are forty or fifty or mort, and pass in single file before the preacher, who silently lays his hands upon therr heads for a moment 11 prayer as they pass
"Some walk off smiling afterwards-and they cannot but feel better for having met a good man, others are so overcome that they collapse-mostly girls and women-and are assisted to benches where they sit untal soon they recover One or two seem overcome by a hind of rigour, but before long it is plam that once more they are feeling better, for invarably they join in the singing and praying

## THE GuRES.

"'Are there any cures" is a question whith is bound to be ashed, and there is but one answer There have been, and in Armagh The number is not known, for no record in kept of those who come up, though it is always hoped that any who have felt benefit will come forward and say so at a future meeting Nor are immediate cures expected, although they are not unknown But at least one man in Armagh, who was suffering from a form of paralysis, has declared that he has been helped, and

## THOSE WHO KNOW HIM

say that this is true
"Another case well vouched for is that of a child whose eye was 'turned' and which has now become normal, and other cases have been spoken of
" If any could not agree with them and their touch of healing, he asked for their sympathy in their work to get people back to the Church of Christ, to follow in love the Christ who died for them He must gue his positive message which would lead men to Jesus Christ
" And then, at the end of each sermon, came the direct question, always answered by some-' Have you found Christ?' Over one hundred converts have been made up to the present."

THERE comes the moment when the husband realises that he is a father He has faced up to the possibility with mased feelings He has longed for the joy of $1 t$, and y et he has almost feared the responsibility of it But the stal moment arrives There can be no further cloubt His beloved wife will be mother-he will be father

As yet a number of months must pass before they look upon the face of their own child But

has come nto ther hearts Together they share a secret the world knows nothing about To the world they are husbanct and wife But to thenselves they are father and mother

The father begins to anticipate Yet even in his joyous anticipation there is a hidden measure of fear The promise of Genesis strll holds-"'In sorrow thou shalt bring forth children " He knows that for mother there will be a deep valley experience before she rises on to the mountan tops of joy

When the full meanıng of the new stage in life has been realised, there will come to every true father the self-asked question. "How can I be the best father? How can 1 as a father attan to the highest expression of fatherhood" Let us attempt to answer this

## 1 Tiue fatherhood commences toward pother

The finest way to serve the new life is to serve mother Every kundess and consideraton shewn toward your uife is a kindness and consideration shewn toward your child Every beautiful thought conveyed to your wife will be a gift to your child You will reach your child through her it has always been your duty and delight to consider your wife, but now you will seek to increase that consideration t') the highest height

How can you do tt ${ }^{2}$ You will conssder her phy-sically-you will consider her sparitually Physical self-control from your side will be most necessary But then you will also encourage your wife in physical control from leer side Whatever you do, don $t$ let her feel she is an invalid She ;s

## NOT AN INVALID,

She is a normal woman passing through a normal experience There is no need to fear that experience The need is for wisdom, not fear Fresh arr, nourshmg food, and a reasonable round of daly duties, are items on which you can prayerfully achise

But your greatest asset wall be spirittulal At no time are spiritual realities more essental than now

God los green a promise which should be the mainstay of every Citrstian mother and father It is found in I Timotiny il 15 "Notwithstanding she shali be saved in chaldbearing, if they continte in fath and charity and holiness with sobriety "

This is a wonderful promise Bui note it is conditional It is conditional upon remaining in faith, love, $J_{\text {tolunese, }}$ self-control

F'ath will indeed be the victory You wall enter into datys of the most blessed oneness with each other Prayer together, Bible reading together, domestic talk together, will create a unity between you never hnown before

You will have a number of very practical problems to face Especially if you beheve in Drime healing and Divine health But your outlook will be balanced if you remember that there were

(see Evodus : 15) Thus you will have no hesitation about proper nursing Regarding a doctor one can on'y say, "Act according to your fauth" Don't act upon other people's theories Keep close to your heavenly Father, and scek $\mathrm{H}_{1 \text { s }}$ gudance in all thangs Withour farth it is impossible to please God-act according to sour fath.

Let it be a settiled thing from the first moments that your child is God's child, and that jou intend simply to train your little one for Him

I think it was Emerson who sand, "What you are speaks so loudly that I cannot hear what you say"

Every earthly father should seek to reveal the Heavenly Father to his child You wall be the only father that your child will know for the first year or so Then he will gradually get to know about his Heavenly Father But the more your child knows about the Heavenly Father the more he should be convinced of the nobility of his own father

You will remember that two qualities supieniely blend in God-love and righteotisness Yuu will cver seek to blend these in your own bearing toward you chuld I have heard fathers say that they lose the: chidren too much to rebuke them or punsh them Such fatherlood is not after the pattern of the fatherhood of God God is love--but He demands ughteousness He also demands obedience The father who himself walks in

## OBEDIENCE TO GOD

is the only father that has a real mond inght to claim obedience from his own children

## 3 True fatherhood is revealed toward the child

Fatherhood should never become a ratherhood Many fathers would ather mother did all the childtraining Child training is not the monopoly of erther parent Both parents have a place in tidumg the child In some ways mother has the first place, but there is a real place for father. He should take care that his training does not clash with his wife's training, but is complemental to it Thus we see the need for oneness between parents They should understand each ocher They should learn to recogmse the duties of each other It certanly is not right for mother to do all the kissing, and father bc left to do all the whupping

So live that you will never disappoint you cluld In many ways father is the chuld's hero It is a tragic thung for the grown chald to discover that atter all there is nothing heroic and noble in father

Great fellows, grants in stature, and many of them grants in sin , were literally smitten down, riml like little children knelt humbly beside the four A most gracious work straghtway began in the depths of the great ship Night after nigh the prayer meetrog was held, and conversions took place dauly Soon they had to send ashore for help, and ministers joyfully came to assist A large number were added to the various churches, and the battleshup becatme a veritable house of Goll The North Carolina was a recening ship, from which men were constantly drafted to other ships The converts of the revisal were thus scattered throughout ine Navy, and borne to the ends of the earth*

## The Deceitful Pear.

The word pear brings to us the thought of fine, luscious fruit But not so in Australta There is found the prickly pear It is commonly referred to as "The Pear" It is a grant cactus armed with powerful needle-shaped spines and bristles These spines can penetrate a stout boot-sole Over $50,000,000$ acres of land in Australia have been overwhelmed by this plant of prolfic growth Before the year 1838 the pear was un-
known in Australa But about that year a Dr Carlisle, salung from Cngland, took one of these plants out in a pot It was carefully tended, and its growth promoted At first it was thought to be a friend But on 1870 this pest had got beyond control Many thousands of pounds have been erpended in order to exterminate the plant It is hoped that now the solution has been obtained by the introduction of insects wheh eat up the pear, and then die when there is nothing more of the plant t) eat

The prickly pear stands as a great warnong to us Let us safeguard aganst seemingly small and pleasant habits which, when they bave once gancil admutance, wit grow and grow untal our whole life is devastated

THE world to-day-and the Church as well-1s tremendously in need of a deeper sense of Sm In old-time revivals and camp-meetings men and women used to be so convicted that they would fall upon their faces and cry out for mercy to God in their teltor over the anfulness of their own sins But to-day some men are esen teaching that there is no such thing as sin

Dr C I Scofield gives a summary of sill as follows
" The literal meanings of the Hebrew and Gieeh words valtously rendered sin, sinner, etc, disclose the true nature of sin in its manfold manifestations Sin is transgression, an over-stepping of the law, the Disine boundary between good and evil (Psalm $h_{1} 1$, Luke ${ }^{\prime}$ 29), inuquity, an act mherently wrong, whether exptessly forbidden or not, error, a departure from the right (Psalm It 9, Rom i1 23), missing the mark, a falure to meet the Divine standalid, trespass, the intrusion of self-will into the sphere of Divine authorsty (Eph 11 1), lawlessness, or spiritual anarchy (I Tim 1 9), unbelluf, or an insult to the Dwne veracity (Jolin xw1 9)

## SIN ORIGINATED WITH SATAN

(Isaiah xiy 12-14), entered the world through Adam (Rom v 12), was, and 1s, unversal, Christ alone excepted (Rom 11123 , I Peter 1122 ), incuis the penaltics of physical and spiritual death (Genesis $n$ 17, u19, Lzek xvin 4, 20, Rom vi 23), and has no remedy but in the sacrificial death of Christ (Heb iv 26 Acts iv 12) avalled of by farth (Acts xal 38, 39) Sin may be summarised as three-fold An act, the volation of, or want of obedience to the revealed will of God, a state, absence of righteousness, a nature, enmity toward God "

They exhibit and demand our serious consideration of incontrovertible evidence of the existence of a Supreme Intelligence And they call to us to bow down and worship the Most High, our Designer and Constructor He that planted the ear, shall He not hear ${ }^{2}$ He that formed the eye, shall. He not see?" (Psalm xciv 9)

What manner of parents are they that can gaze into the eyes of their own children and see only derivatives, and a developed substance called protoplasm ${ }^{2}$ Their attitude is unnatual and attrbutable t) the out-working of a s:nister unbelief

Oh, for the affectionate fathers and mothers who, standing in awe and wonder, and bending over the furms of their little ones, become conscious of their embrace in the arms of a loving heavenly Father As Shakespeare says,

What a plece of work is a man' How noble in reason ${ }^{1}$ How ufinite ${ }^{11}$ faculties' In form and moving, hmw express and admerable' In actuon, how tike an angel' In apprehension, how like a god' The beauty of the world' The paragon of ammals
Our wonderful machnes of flesh and blood that can see, hear, talk, feel and move, remember events of the past and think and plan concerning the present and the future, and are capable of repudiating their Maker, ought to be traned to know, to obey and to glorify Him

No matter what others may do, we, with our bodies, souls and spirits should enthusiastically extol and serve Him "For in Him we live, and move, and have our beng " (Acts xvil 28)

## His New City.

Before reading this lesson turn to Luke iv 30, 31 and Matthew iv 13, and you will see that after the Lord left His own town of Nazareth, never to return, He came and dwelt in the city of Capornaum If you have your map handy and care to foll wo the journey, it will be ciear to you that it would take H im through Cana of Gallee, and across the rolling hills leading to the lake until they came to what are hnown as the Horns of Hathin It is hardly hikely that they would turn to the right here and go down the road to Tiberias, because there is no mention in the Nen Testament that our Lord ever usited that city is the path passes between these craggy heights there is a wonderful vew of the country, the beaut 1 ful lake of Gallee lying below at then feet, while awny to the north the snowcapped mountains of Lebanon dommated the landscape 1 hcy came down from the hills to the rich plain of Gennesaret, and crossed it to Capernaum, which is situated at the north-west end of the lake, and as they did so they would find that the fields looked more frutful, the fruit on the trees was more advanced, and the ur feeling much warmer, for the lahe lies over 650 feet below sea level, whereas the mountans they had left rose over 1,500 feet above the Mediterranean Winter seems like spring at Capernaum, and spring like summer Thus city was to become famous as the home of the Lord Jesus, " the house" was there (Iark ix 33), and Capernaum became known as His own city (Matt ix 1)

It was an important place in those fays, for there must have been a garrison of troops stationed there, otherwise there would have been no centurion (Luke va 1-5) a tax-gatherer was resıdent in the place, and there was a customhouse (Mark il 14) Besides this there must have been a large fishing industry, which would probably also mean that there was 1 brisk trade in boat-building and net-making The ruins of the synagogue (of which more will be said in a loter lesson) are the largest so far discovered in the whole of Galilee Here Peter would meet his wife again, and John run to greet his father Zebedee and in one of their homes the Lord Jesus became the honoured guest Nazareth had refused H.m, but rov in this lovely spot and among these warm-hearted Galilean fishermen He made H is home, performed many of His maghty miracles,
and chose those who should carry on His work

## Words and Deeds

(1) IV THE ASSEVBLY (Vark : 21-28)

Boys and girs, as well as men and women, luke a person who not only talks about things, but who gets things done Dan Crawford, when he translated the Acts into one of the African languages, ertitled it "Words about Deeds", and the record in our lesson is ro orily an account of our Lord's first visit to the synngogue at Capernaum, but of the deeds that followed The Lord Jesus had gone to the synagogue, and I have not the stightest doubt that it was packed to the doors to near the new Teacher, and as He taught with authority (Mark 1 22) and with power (Luke iv 32) suddenly there was an awfur shriek The Devil had gone to the synagogue as well as the Lord Jesus' This man was not suck with any disease, to the ordinary person he would have appeared as quite nurmal, but he was possessed by an unclean demon At some time or other this man had yielded himself and his members to $\sin$ in such an awful way that he was possessed by a devil of uncleanness, but he stsll went to the synagogue, and was probably looked upon as an ornament to the communty When the Iord Jesus came to the service that merning, sin rould not be hid- He , the Son of God called then to repent (Matt iv 17), and at once the man cried out, "Let us alone, what have we to do with Thee, Thou Jesus of Nazareth Art Ihou come to destroy us? I hnow Thee who Thou art, the Holy One of God " (Vark 1 24)
The Lord Jesus replied, " Be muzzled, and come out of h.m "' (the word the Lord used is "phimoo" and you will find that translated " muzzie" in I Cor 1x 9, and I Tim • 18) Wild corvulsions seized the man, he yelled, fell upon the floor in the madst (cf Mark i 25 and Luke iv 35), and then arose unhurt and free No wonder astonishment fell upon the congregation, and as they poured out of the synagogue, down the steps, into the streets of the city, and out to the region round about Gallee, the story of that Sabbath morning at Capernaum was spread abroad He not only preached, but He commanded, words were not all, there were deeds that followed with power and authority Ask your boys and girls, ask your own heart, as you sit in the Sunday school or in the church or meeting-place-If Jesus came and spole, would you cry out, not because of open sin or disease, but of hidden shame and uncleanness? Then remember that there is a time coming when there is nothing hid from the eyes of $\mathrm{H}_{1} \mathrm{~m}$ with whom we have to do (Heb iv 13), and that He is coming to bring
to light the hidden things, and $u$ ill make manfest the counsels of the hearts (I Cor iv 5) Deeds will soon take the place of words
(2) IV THE HOME (Vark : 29-31)

Many unkind things nave been said on the subject of mothers-in-law, but it is pleasant to see that Peter obvtously thought very highly of his wife s mother, and that he told the Lord Jesus about her sichness Luhe the physician informs us that it was a great fever, and the word used consey, the hnowledge that it "ns a burning fever wath the usual high te uperature (Luke iv 38) As soon as the $I$ ord saw the pattent, He rebulved tha feler, tooh her by the hand, and rued her up, so that she was able to minister to them immediately The strengit of H 's word rebuked the lakesud fever just as it had the unclean $d$ mon in the synagogue $H_{1 s}$ deeds of mercy ware not onis performed in the open glare of the public aseembly, He wis jus as tender and considerate in the honce where He lodged, and to the tired sick one in her own room, as He was in the full blaze of publicity

## (3) I THE CITY (Vark 1 32-34)

Tired after a heavy and exciting day, the group in Simon's house were settling down for the night, the sabbath sun had set and night was quickly descending on this lake-side city, when the noise of a crond is heard Vonces, shouts, fonts'eps, cries, until all the sick and suffering of Capernaum were standing and pressing round a fisherman's dwelling " 11 the cty was gathered together at the door" ( \ark 133 ), and the same power, the same word, and the same uonderful love met the needs of many, cast out many derils, and land His hands on every one of them and hea'ed them (Luke iv 41) His new home was besieged with people seeking H im, while $\mathrm{H}_{15}$ own city sought for stones to slay $\mathrm{H} \cdot \mathrm{m}$ The secret uncleanness of the heart, the patient sufferer in the sickroom, and the multtude standing patsently 1. the darkening street all found their needs met and their sicknesses healed $b_{v}$ the stranger Guest that they had received into their midst, when those who ought to have known H 1 m had spurned $\mathrm{H}_{1} \mathrm{~m}$ from therr gates
(4) IN THE DISTRICIS ROUND ABOUT (lark 1 35-39)

When all men on the city were see ${ }^{k}$ ing Him , the Lord was not content to abide in one place, but pressed on to the other towns throughout all Galilee Now compare this fourfold service, in the assembly, the home, the caty, and the country round about, with Acts : 8 The Lord commands us to witness in Jerusalem, Judæa, Samaria, and then to the uttermost parts Service begins in the chureh and the home, but does not stop there, it reaches out to regions beyond The Lord's method of word and work must be ours also

Only one sort of money is really of true mintage in the signt of God, and that is money which has been properly acquired
